Canadian pipeline necessary for resource control

KINGSTON (CUP) An all Canadian pipeline to move crude oil from western sources to eastern markets is absolutely necessary if Canada is to regain at least partial control over some of its natural resources

Blake Sanford, National Farmers Union Ontario co-ordinator, said recently the proposed pipeline to feed Montreal refineries should be built across northern Ontario by the federal government as a public utility

The Sarnia to Montreal pipeline across southern Ontario would put some of Canada's best farm land out of production, said Sanford. "The building and operation of an all-Canadian pipeline as a public utility will cost more
