Champions from 20 countries around the world such as Argentina's Roberto DeVincenzo England's Nich Faldo. Spain's Manuel Pinero. Korea's Han Chang Sang and Arnold Palmer of the U.S.A.

In the words of Gary Player the National is one of the great golf courses in the world. Designed in 1973 by world famous golf course architects George and Tom Fazio the mammoth 6,975 yard par 71 course features eight natural water hazards and no less than 60 bunkers.
