Dear Sir:

Mr. Jerome D. Greene has forwarded to me your communication to him of the 13th instant, requesting information as to the extent of the field of investigation touching upon the methods of treatment of personnel of business organization to be covered by the Rockefeller Foundation. As Mr. Greene has indicated in his reply, I am at present engaged upon a survey of the field of industrial relations, but I expect it will be some little time yet before there will be opportunity to investigate in detail any of its outstanding features. Should the method of treatment of personnel of business organizations be ultimately made a part of any feature of this organization, I shall gladly let you know. At present it is not contemplated to give any special study to this particular phase.

For your information, I enclose a copy of an abstract of testimony given before the Industrial Relations Commission at its hearings in New York, which will serve to indicate the purpose, scope, and method of the investigation of industrial relations under the Rockefeller Foundation.
