Hon. David McCurdy Dead.

Halifax, June 13.—Hon. David McCurdy, ex-M. P. of Baddeck, died on Saturday, after a week's illness, of pneumonia. Mr. McCurdy, who was 55 years old, was a grandson of one of the pioneers of Nova Scotia, his ancestor, Alex. McCurdy, having come to this Province from Londonderry in 1760. Mr. McCurdy was for 24 years a member of the Legislative Council of this Province. Three years ago he removed to Toronto, but recently returned to Baddeck. He was a granduncle of Prof. J. F. McCurdy of Toronto University.

Norway to Send Envoy.

Christiania, June 13.—Mr. Loveland, formerly president of the section of the Norwegian Council of State at Stockholm, who will be inducted into his office of Foreign Minister of Norway on June 15, in an interview yesterday said that a special envoy will in a few weeks be despatched to the great powers to seek the recognition of the diplomatic and consular representatives of Norway.

Both Pled Not Guilty.

Ottawa, June 13.—Joseph Clements and his wife were arraigned in the Police Court yesterday morning on the charge of stealing \$550 from the Ottawa Jewellery Co. They pleaded not guilty, though Policemen stated that the charge was not pressed against his wife.

TORY SOLDIERS MARCH

Ordered to Leave London in Time to Spoil Their Votes.

Second Reading of the Permanent Force Increase Bill.—Sir Frederick Borden Denies That Adoption of the Policy of a Standing Army is Contemplated or That General Force is to Be Depleted.

Ottawa, June 13.—Another of those unsavory incidents came up yesterday in the House that will help to brand this Government as one prone to the habit of petty political jobs. Half a dozen of the permanent force in London received sudden marching orders on Saturday night for Niagara. They were unanimously Conservatives in politics. Hence the Government desired under cover of an imperative military order to get them out of the way on polling day.

The matter was brought up by Col. Hughes and a united attack was made by Messrs. Borden, Foster, Tisdale, Ingham and other Conservative members. Sir Frederick Borden read this telegram from Mr. Hyman: "It is reported that several men in barracks here are ordered to Niagara. To-day (Tuesday) is polling day here and I should like it arranged so as to permit these men to vote before they leave." (Signed) C. S. Hyman.

After this Col. Tisdale poured hot shot into the Minister of Militia and the backdoor came.

Sir Frederick Borden then declared he would have the men there if possible in order to vote. He disclaimed any knowledge of which way the men were voting.

Increasing the Strength.
The second reading of the Government bill to amend the Militia Act to increase the permanent force to 5,000 was then taken up, and Mr. Foster asked that it stand over until more information was vouchsafed by the Minister of Militia.

Sir Frederick Borden entered into a lengthy denial of the published statement that it was the intention to create a permanent force. Sir Frederick said there was no desire to create a standing army such as had been prophesied in the public press in Great Britain and Canada. In the opinion of the Militia Council and the Government it was thought desirable that the British taxpayer should be relieved of some part of the cost of maintaining a permanent force, but it was in a greater degree looking after the instruction of the rising generation of militia in Canada.

Mr. Borden asked why the North-west Mounted Police would not look after the new Province of Alberta and Saskatchewan as they had done formerly?

The Minister said that as these new Provinces were being established it was thought better in the public interest to establish instruction depots in them. It was the aim of the Council to establish depots of this character throughout the country from coast to coast. There could be in touch with each other. The force at Halifax would be 1,000 men, while at Vancouver would be 1,000 men. The balance of 1,000 could be used to fill up the gaps and for use later on. The British garrisons amounted 1,800, to 2,000 men each, while Gen. Lake expected to do with 1,500 to 1,600.

Not An Indian Gift.

"There is no intention to reduce the expenditure on the active militia, because of the taking over of these two forces," he said. "It would be what might be called an Indian gift to do anything like that. While we are relieving the British taxpayer we would not be strengthening the British Empire. Such contemptible ideas have entered into my mind or the mind of any member of this Government. He could not understand the motive of anybody who pretended to be a military critic—he meant persons outside the House, not members—putting forward a statement of that kind."

Col. Hughes asked if it were not so that such was the difficulty in getting men for the permanent force that its strength was now only 900, when the establishment called for 1,200 to 1,500 men. Sir Frederick said this was not so, the establishment called for 1,200 men, the contrary, which appeared in the newspapers, were injurious and incorrect.

Col. Hughes wanted to know about the artillery at Kingston.

"Of course I am not able to understand the adjutant-general's report," replied Sir Frederick rather testily. "But so far as I do understand it states that the establishment is full."

Sir Frederick continued that it had been cabled over to The London Times the other day that in order to take the militia every militia regiment in Canada would be denuded of one of its companies. That statement was absolutely without foundation, and if the man who sent that misleading cable and wanted to do his duty to his country and his paper and to the Government, he would first have gone to the Militia Department and obtained correct information. As a matter of fact the militia force was being increased, and this year would be several thousand more than we ever had in this country since the Fenian raid. There was no truth either in the statement that the Government had adopted the policy of a standing army.

A Million a Year.
The Minister said that it would cost about one million dollars a year to maintain the two garrisons.
Col. Hughes quoted that with the establishment of the permanent force was 1,245, its strength on December 31, 1904, was only 907.
"That may have been so then," Sir Frederick answered, "but now the strength is 1,300."
"Well," replied Col. Hughes, "this is the latest information available to the public, the latest report of the Department of Militia, and the Minister has no just cause to blame those who believe and rely upon that report."
Col. Tisdale spoke at some length on the policy of taking over the Halifax and Esplanade fortifications. He wanted to be sure the Government was fully advised of the magnitude of the task it was undertaking. For all the Min-

Inter had said there was very little distinction between the permanent force and a standing army, and if Canada were going to adapt themselves to the ever-changing methods of modern artillery.

Public Works Estimate.
The estimates for the Department of Public Works were taken up last night, and Hon. Mr. Brodeur, Minister of Inland Revenue, took the place of the absent Minister, Mr. Hyman. Some consternation was raised at this juncture by a temporary hitch in the electric light, owing to a thunderstorm that was raging outside. The business of the House was taken up with estimates for the Province of Quebec, wharves, piers, etc.

Has Cost Too Much.
In Committee of Supply, considered the item of \$125,000 for the Pacific cable. Sir Wilfrid explained it had cost \$2,000,000. This was apportioned as follows: Canada, five-eighths; Australia, six-eighths; New Zealand, two-eighths; Great Britain, five-eighths. The net receipts were \$79,824.

The most important feature of the Prime Minister's statement was that expectations had not been realized. Sir William Mulock was now on his way to London to see how the expenses could be curtailed.

AFTER TORONTO WORLD.

Montreal Council Will Act to Maintain its Dignity.

Montreal, June 13.—On motion of Ald. Payette, seconded by Ald. Robitard, the following passed unanimously in council yesterday:

"Whereas a daily newspaper, The World, published in the City of Montreal, inserted in its issue of 6th of June, 1905, a sensational article defamatory in character and libelous in nature against the council of the City of Montreal;

"Whereas the said newspaper circulates in the City and District of Montreal and that article of such a character is liable to cause prejudice to the city council and to injure its reputation and good name in the public mind;

"Whereas all the insinuations and allegations in said article are defamatory, libelous and untrue;

"And whereas the city council of Montreal is anxious to maintain its dignity and reputation, while declining the publication of such defamatory articles, and protesting against the same, in the name of the whole body of ratepayers, hereby instruct the city attorneys to institute in connection therewith such civil and criminal proceedings as they may deem advisable, and to retain counsel in this connection in the event of the same being deemed advisable."

JAMES CONNIE MUST PAY.

Bought Lake Superior Stock on Margin and Lost Thereby.

Toronto, June 13.—Judgment for A. E. Ames & Co. has been awarded on the appeal in their action against James Connée, M. P., for margins. This decision supports that of Chancellor Boyd, who found \$4,000 due to the brokers, as a result of the sale of 800 shares of Consolidated Lake Superior stock, bought on Mr. Connée's order. This stock was bought at \$9 1/2, with a margin of \$2,000. He afterwards put up \$1,500 more, but the stock was sold at \$21-100 being a large balance uncovered.

Mr. Connée held that the 800 shares would never have been delivered to him as they were pledged to the bank as security for Ames & Co.'s liabilities. Justice Anglin did not agree with the judgment of Chief Justice Falconbridge and Mr. Justice Britton. He holds as a matter of fact that the right of brokers to hypothecate their customers' stock to secure their own general indebtedness.

Justice Britton says: "The relationship of broker and client were established, the broker is entitled to indemnity for the instructions of his principal. In this case Mr. Connée could have, any time, taken up or sold the stock and closed the account."

THE SOO DIRECTORATE.

Ontario Government Appoints Successors to Mr. N. W. Rowell, K. C.

Toronto, June 13.—Formerly Whitney announced yesterday morning that Mr. W. H. Plummer, a merchant of Sault Ste. Marie, had been appointed to the Board of Consolidated Lake Superior Co. as one of the Government's representatives in succession to Mr. N. W. Rowell, K. C., who has resigned. The Government has also named Mr. W. H. Hearst, solicitor of Sault Ste. Marie, as the Government's agent in connection with the company, a position which Mr. Rowell also occupied.

Bible in the Schools.

Toronto, June 13.—By a vote of 13 to 10 the Congregational Union, at yesterday's session, decided to accept the invitation of the Anglican General Synod looking toward the appointment of a committee to confer with a view to the teaching of the Bible in the public school.

The Niagara Camp.

Niagara on the Lake, June 13.—The largest military camp in Canadian history and the last on old plains of Niagara will be in full swing to-night with between five and six thousand men under canvas. There will be about 5,000 men in camp to-night, occupying 1,000 tents. The camp will include 3 cavalry regiments, 3 brigades of artillery, 1 field company of Engineers, Corps of Guides, 12 regiments of Infantry, Army Service Corps, 2 Field Hospitals, 2 Bearers Corps. The infantry regiments are the Composite City Corps, the 15th York Rangers, 45th Simoes Foresters, 56th Peel Regiment, 20th Hatter Rifles, 23rd Parry Sound Regiment, 21st Grey Regiment, 37th Haldimand Rifles, 38th Norfolk, 77th Wentworth, and 24th Ontario. The 44th Lincoln and Welland Regiment pitched tents yesterday.
