Pork-packers' Addresses.—An interesting and instructive feature of the meeting was the addresses of Mr. Chester Fearman, Hamilton, and Mr. C. C. L. Wilson, Ingersoll, who are prominent pork-packers, and who gave useful information to the farmers and breeders present in regard to the size and quality of hogs required for the export bacon trade, illustrated by object lessons in the form of specimen sides of bacon, showing the desirable or ideal sort side by side with the undesirable, underfed and overfatted carcases. The discussion which followed regarding the best foods and methods of mixing and feeding was very interesting and helpful to many present.

The Dominion Minister of Agriculture has arranged for the fitting up of the steamship Reta, of the Pickford and Blake line, from Halifax to the West Indies, with cold storage. This is now being used for the carriage of quite large quantities of poultry, meats and butter. It promises to be a new market of considerable value.

Annual Meeting of the American Guernsey Cattle Club.

Guernsey Cattle Club.

The 19th annual meeting of the American Guernsey Cattle Club was held at the Fifth Avenue Hotel, New York City, Dec. 8th. A very large number of the members were either present or represented, and great interest was shown. The report of the secretary and treasurer, Wm. H. Caldwell, showed that the season of 1897 had been the most prosperous one in the history of the Club. More entries of both bulls and cows had been made during the year than in any previous year. A corresponding increase was also shown in the number of transfers issued. The financial statement given showed that after paying all expenses there was left to the credit of the club \$801.97. Seven members have qualified during the year, and four deaths among the rembers have been reported to the office. Up to the present date there has been issued 160 certificates of membership, and 120 names appear upon the list as active members. The retiring officers were all re-elected, namely: President; James M. Codman, Brookline, Mass. Vice-Presidents: Levi P. Morton, Rhinecliff, N. Under the head of new business the question of offering encouragement to breeders to conduct home tests of their animals was quite generally discussed, and it was resolved:—

"That it is the sense of the meeting that butter tests should be started, and that the manner of conducting the same should be left with the Executive Committee with power to act. It seemed to be the general opinion of the members present that such tests should be made upon the basis of the amount of butterfat produced during the year. and that there should be three prizes offered for records of single animals and three for records of herds consisting

and that the Executive Committee be authorized to give same for such prizes at the Exposition as they deemed best.

A discussion upon the scale of points for Guernseys resulted in the following vote:—
"That the present scale of points be referred to the Executive Committee to report at the next annual meeting any changes they may deem expedient in same."

Mr. Hobson, in reply to the address of welcome, complimented the Brantford Beard on the excellent management, provision and reception. He conveyed to them the best wishes of the Guelph Fat Stock Club. Since Mr. Hobson has become acquainted by actual observation and contact with the British meat market, he was able to assure the meeting advisedly on the necessity of keeping the quality of our meat stock in the very fore front, in order to hold a large place in that market.

Mr. Preston represented the stock and dairy interests of the district in a very bright address, holding up before them the probable repoid advance in agricultural facility and

He expressed the opinion that Edward Bellamy's prophecy, that electricity will gradually take the place of all other powers, is not too much to expect.

Hon. John Dryden, after complimenting the Board of Management on the success of the show and the attendance of the present gathering, referred to the exceeding more skill necessary in the breeding and fitting of high-class animals than is necessary in the production of inanimate machinery and contrivances. The wealth and nobility of England represented in agriculture was referred to, and the same tendency in the American Republic, as well as in our own Dominion, is apparent.

Hon. Sidney Fisher expressed pleasure at seeing the show in its new field such a great success. The enormous improvement in the agricultural situation during the Jubilee year was referred to at length. Population is what is needed in this country and Mr. Fisher hopes that our gold fields will give us a great influx of people. Reference was made to the continuously increasing demand.


