LAND REGULATIONS.

n Mauitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Doninion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made to any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his home-A settler who has exhausted his home-stead right may take a purchased home-stead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to re-duction in case of rough, scrubby or stony

Old World Notes

A hook and eye revival may possibly result in England from the shortage in those useful metal pressstuds which during the past few years have to a very large extent been used as a fastening for ladies' dresses. The manufacture of these press-studs was principally in the hands of the Germans, and the result of the stoppage of supplies is to be seen in the price which has now to be paid for them, Prior to the war drapers were able to sell these fastenings two dozen or three dozen, mounted on a card, for a penny. The most they can now give that they are experiencing very great difficulty in obtaining further supplies and when present stocks are exhiustplenished. The only alternative therefore appears to be a return to the

The Medway is now navigable for barges 100 feet, in length, with a beam of 20 feet, and a draft of 5 feet bridge. This improvement is the result of an Act of Parliament which received the Royal Assent in June 1911 Not only is the river now available for the passage of large barges, but the past winter, with quite an abnor-mal rainfall, has shown that the reconstruction has proved a benefit to of irrigation and sanitation. Tonbridge especially profits, for there is now no fear of the town being visited by the disastrous floods experienced curing past years. Where there were thirteen locks before, there are now only ten within the distance of sixteen miles three having been done away with and the river at these spots considerably widened.

The total value of British contri butions to war charities during the first year of war is estimated at one hundred and twenty-five million dollars. The gifts made through agencies in the British possessions would perhaps bring this total up to near one hundred and seventy-five millio ! dollars. Australian contributions in money alone exceeded fifteen million dollars. The Prince of Wales' fund for the year reached a total of twenty. seven and a half million dollars; Belgian relief commission has had gifts of nearly ten million dollars; Times' Red Cross fund was about eight million dollars, whle other large sums were given through the Young Men's Christian Association and oth-


