MURDER IS OUT AFTER 5 YEARS

All Tennessee is Stirred by
Exposures in a Forgotten
Assassination.

Nine Men are Implicated in the
Killing of a Doctor
Back in '96.

Cincinnati Ohio, Aug. 25—A special to the Enquirer from Nashville, Tenn. says: A sensation that will spread like wildfire over Tennessee has developed in Gallatin, where four of the most prominent citizens of Sumner county, and one of this city, have been placed under arrest for alleged complicity in the assassination of Dr. A. H. Williams, who was shot down at most at his own door on the night of April 10, 1896. It is said that nine men altogether are charged with being implicated but those who are arrested are as follows: Edgar Mann, farmer and stock raiser, Hendersonville; Rufus Bell, farmer, Hendersonville; Hadden Dodd, real estate agent Nashville, and Henry Wherry, postmaster, Hendersonville. They, men, it is claimed, made bond in Gallatin in the sum of \$10,000 each, but the affair was kept a profound secret, as the grand jury of Sumner county returned indictments against the alleged conspirators and the officers of the law are said to be hot after the others some of whom are said to be the men who did the killing.

No crime ever occurring in middle Tennessee was any more startling or shocking than that which sent Dr. Williams into eternity. On the night of the tragedy he was out of his home on a false summons, and just as he was leaving his own gate on horseback he was fired on twice and fell riddled with bullets. The crime set the community into disorder and at a mass meeting the next day a reward of \$1,000 was offered for the assassin, the sum being raised to \$1,500 by the state. Every device of human ingenuity was brought to bear to ferret the murderers out, and detectives fixed the guilt on Rufus Bell, Wm. Butler and Tom Jones. They were tried and dismissed.

The secret of Dr. Williams' killing had been buried for more than five years. His brave wife, who had cried in vain for justice against the slayer of her husband, sank early into her grave, following the husband within a year after his tragic death.

Dr. J. L. Thompson, a prominent druggist of this city, a brother of Mrs. Williams, exhausted the accumulation of years in trying to discover the murderers and in fighting damage suits against him. The Williams killing figured into almost forgotten history, when Tom Jones revived the case with startling effect. The attorney general at Gallatin, and later to the grand jury, which brought about the indictments.

In this he claimed to have had repeated offers to do the work of assassinating the physician, and refused, but knew all about the crime, having been let into the confidence of those implicated.

The confession of Jones is in effect that two men did the shooting, backed up by others. The actual assassins, it is charged, are now out of the state, which is the cause of the secrecy regarding the affair.
