The weakness in the majority report, Mr. Laurie had felt, was that \$10,000 seemed merely a huge guess, the providing of two representatives for the young men was a guess-they might be overestimated or underestimated. It was not the way business men would launch a project of the kind. Again the question arose, had the association the right to take the money of the citizens and exclude them practically from participation in its ex-penditure and the use to which it should be put. If the churches undertook the responsibility of financing the institution, then they should have the direction of its business-not otherwise. It was not the idea to make this institution an adjunct of any church or churches, but a popular homelike and athletic centre, where the influences would be elevating. healthy and helpful-a place where

meet in common intercourse and good fellowship. Mr. McLachlan, who seconded the notion, spoke briefly. He believed in placing the institution on a businesslike basis. He thought if it were possible to secure, say a dozen good business men to make a large investment and thereby secure their active interest as investors and to
