EARL GREY SAILS.

Many Notables Give Governor-General
Send-Off From London.

London, Dec. 2.—Earl Grey, who
succeeds the Earl of Minto as Gov-
ernor-General of Canada, started yes-
terday morning for his post, accom-
panied by the Countess, their two daugh-
ters and two aides-de-camp. Among
the many persons who gathered to
bid them farewell at the railroad
station were Foreign Secretary Lans-
downe, the Earl and Countess of Min-
to, Lord Strathcona and Mount Roy-
al, the Canadian High Commissioner;
the Duke of Abercorn, Colonial
Secretary Lyttelton, and the Ameri-
can Charge d'Affaires, Henry White.
The travelers will embark on the Allan
Line steamer Parisian after an offi-
cial reception by the Lord Mayor of
Liverpool.

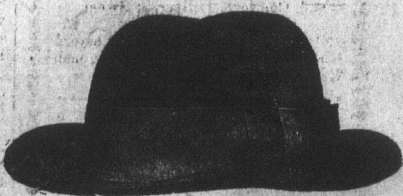
