London, Dec. 2.-Earl Grev. succeeds the Earl of Minto as Gover-nor-General of Canada, started yes-day morning for his post, accompan-ied by the Countess, their two daughters and two aides-de-camp. Among the many persons who gathered to bid them tarewell at the railroad station were Foreign Secretary Lans-downe, the Earl and Countess of Min-to, Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, the Canadian High Commission al, the Canadian High Commissioner; the Duke of Abercorn, Colonial Secretary Lyttelton, and the Ameri-Charge d'Affaires, Henry White. The travelers will embark on the Allan Line steamer Parisian after an official reception by the Lord Mayor of Liverpool.
