The Letter-Box

To the Editor of The Planet:

Dear Sir,—I notice in the issue of The Planet under date of Sept. 24th last, headed "Local View of Fish Scandal," signed by Caleb Wheeler, and as one of the fishermen referred to, I wish to take this opportunity of replying to Mr. Wheeler's statements. In the second paragraph Mr. Wheeler states that nets are not allowed on the American side of the line. I wish to deny this statement, as I know that nets are allowed on the American side of the line at any time of the year, there being no close season whatever. I am informed on good authority that Mr. Stephens has nothing whatever to do with this department. Mr. Pardo has, as this question is dealt with entirely by the Toronto House. The fishermen of the places referred to in this letter, who are also farmers, saw no such petition as referred to in this letter. As far as I know there are no foreigners, retired tradesmen or farmers in this fishing business whatever. We are born Canadians who live near these waters and we spend all our money in this County of Kent. I can guarantee that any fisherman would give at least a quarter of a cent preference to any Canadian firm or party who would be willing to buy our fish, and not a man in this business in this county is under any American Trust whatever. All nets and supplies are purchased by US direct from the manufacturers, and are paid for spot cash, C. O. D., express, and Mr. Wheeler can verify these facts by referring to any express office in this city, I emphatically deny the statement that we are agents of any Trust or Trusts, whatever.

We are abiding strictly by our license and there are no nets set in marshes or elsewhere as prohibited by said license. I must admit that there are a few bass caught in the hoop nets, but these are certainly released as soon as the nets are lifted. It would be impossible to avoid the taking of some bass in these nets. If that portion of the lake between Grassy Point and Tick Tack Point is filled with the nets, as Mr. Wheeler states, how is it that at this season of the year tugs with five and six large scows loaded with sugar beets are continually running between these points. How can we fishermen who are fishing outside these points destroy the spawn of the green bass in Mitchell's Bay? Our principal catch is coarse fish and I doubt if any fisherman on these waters ever lifted a net and found more bass than coarse fish. Although the license calls for a lead of only 8 rods in length, we must inform Mr. Wheeler that the Minister of Marine and Fisheries has given us a special permission to use a lead of 125 yards, and I can assure you that a lead longer than this is never used. For the past three years we have been using the same lead.

It is the carp that destroys the spawn of the bass. We have also permission (and have had for the past three years) to take and ship pickerel. This permission was given by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries. Any person wishing to go for a day's outing and have a fish, can catch as many fish as he could ten years ago. I must give our inspectors credit, as they come at least two or three times a month and not only supervise the shipping but also go out and see the nets lifted, and see that they are placed all right.

Mr. Wheeler or any one else can come and inspect our shipments at any time and I will guarantee that they will be found all right, and as I said before, Mr. Wheeler or any one else can come and buy our fish for a quarter of a cent less than any American at any time of the year.

Mr. Wheeler, who claims to be such a sport, has never been seen by me anywhere fishing yet, and I firmly believe that if he ever wanted to catch any of his so-called green bass he would not take the trouble to go to any water but simply stay in his own shop and catch them, in fact this is where he would rather catch them.

I have been a fisherman for thirty years and fish are of a better quality and more plentiful now than they have ever been. According to Mr. Bastedo the present laws are both fair and just to both the angler and the net fishermen. I give Mr. Stephens credit for coming down and inspecting the surveying party and Mr. T. L. Pardo came down and inspected the fisheries with the Minister of Fisheries. Both of these gentlemen found everything all right when they went over the waters.

AN ELECTION DODGE

The Public Works Department of the Dominion of Canada are contemplating the spending of more money at Rondeau harbor with a view to improving it and making it even better port than it is for the increasing traffic that is being carried on there.

Mr. Walter C. Brough, of Goderich, a civil engineer, has been sent to Rondeau this past week by the Government to get details as to what can be done. It is thought that by building a breakwater out into the lake the filling up of the channel leading into Rondeau will be prevented. Accordingly, if the breakwater is built, it will extend out from the east pier into the lake, and from the end of this another will run south. Mr. Brough will submit his plans and estimates to the Department.

There is no doubt but that a breakwater such as is planned would improve the harbor, as the present channel is continually filling in and constant dredging is necessary to make it of necessary depth.—Blenheim News-Tribune.

UNIQUE EVENT

A unique event was celebrated on Tuesday at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Fuce, Jackson street, the occasion being the celebration of their golden wedding. A handsome and abundant dinner was partaken of by the guests at one o'clock. Tables were spread in the house and under the trees and the scene was very pretty. Afterwards a most enjoyable time was spent in social intercourse.

James Fuce was born on Feb. 3rd, 1829, in Oxfordshire, England, and when but four years of age came with his parents to Canada. They settled at once in the Township of Raleigh, and Mr. Fuce's earliest remembrance of Kent County is the wilderness that it certainly must have been at that time.

Martha Ann Hinds was born in the County of Kent, England, on Feb. 6, 1836, and like Jas. Fuce, came with her parents to Canada when four years of age.

Both James Fuce and Martha Ann Hinds grew up in Raleigh Township, and on the 18th of October, 1854, they were married. For twenty-six years Mr. and Mrs. Fuce lived in Raleigh. Then in 1880 they retired from active labor of life and made their home in Blenheim.

Three children blessed the union of Mr. and Mrs. Fuce. Oliver J., now a resident of Toronto, Mrs. (Rev.) A. D. Whaley resides at North Amherst, Ohio, and Alice, who died at the age of five years.

The arrangements for the anniversary of the wedding were inaugurated and carried out by the son and daughter, who are living 350 miles apart, entirely without the knowledge of their parents. A remarkable feature was that ten persons were present who were at the wedding 50 years ago. Five grandchildren and one great grandchild were also present.

From the verandah of the house on Tuesday afternoon addresses appropriate to the occasion were given by Rev. W. E. Kerr, Pastor from Charing Cross, and ex-Mayor Jas. Greenwood, of Blenheim. No one could help noticing that Mr. and Mrs. Fuce are still in good health and bid fair to be able in ten years to observe their diamond wedding.
