IMMIGRATION QUESTION.

J. T. Dunsford, editor of the Bridgewater Mercury and Somerset County Gazette, an English paper, is now in Canada to see the country, and has been giving some of his impressions to the Toronto press. He says the country districts of England are being denuded of young men, so much so that the outlook has become gloomy indeed. He says that if Canada could only take the surplus from the overcrowded cities it would be a positive benefit to Great Britain. But such immigrants are not wanted in Canada, unless they can adapt themselves to farm life. Ontario is being depopulated also by the emigration to the Northwest, and we need the rural workers to take their places. Mr. Dunsford also questioned if the money now expended in securing further immigrants from Britain would not be better used in caring more generously for the newcomers to the country, and leaving their success or failure less to chance. There may be some force in this suggestion, but it is not to be expected that the Laurier Government, having given \$5 a head to a sham immigration agency for European immigrants, can afford to spend money to retain population already on Canadian soil.

OUR MINERAL WEALTH.

The St. Thomas Journal man has been looking up statistics relating to Ontario's mineral wealth and he has succeeded in bringing out some interesting information.

In a recent report prepared by Thomas W. Gibson, director of the Ontario Bureau of Mines, the wealth of the Province of Ontario in minerals is shown. The report is a bulky volume, carefully and conveniently arranged, and from it is gleaned that we possess in greater or less quantity gold, silver, platinum, palladium, cobalt, copper, nickel, iron, lead and zinc. Our advance in developing our mineral resources has been great in the last ten years. In 1895 there was no silver reported; in 1904 \$11,887 worth of that metal had been mined. In 1895, no platinum; in 1904, \$10,452 worth. Palladium, cobalt, iron ore, pig iron, steel, lead ore, pig lead and zinc ore were unknown quantities; in 1904 the values reported were: Palladium, \$18,564; cobalt, \$36,620; iron ore, \$108,068; pig iron, \$1,811,664; steel, \$1,188,349; lead ore, \$11,000; pig lead, \$2,500; zinc ore, \$3,700. There are also the following items from the non-metallic products: Actinolite, \$102; arsenic, \$903; carbide of calcium, \$152,295; corundum, \$150,645; feldspar, \$21,966; graphite, \$4,700; iron pyrites, \$43,718; talc, \$2,919. The value of metallic products has increased in the last five years from a total value of \$2,565,386 to \$4,906,677. In non-metallic mineral products the increase has been from \$9,298,624 in 1900 to \$11,572,547 in 1904.

NORTH AMERICAN LIFE.

Mr. Goldman Tells Commission of a Dilatory Departmental Ruling, Voting by Policyholders.

Toronto, May 23.—After a lengthy discussion the commission on insurance decided yesterday that they would not hear evidence on Victoria Day, but would at longer to-day and Friday.

The examination of Mr. Goldman was concluded yesterday. Actuary Kilgour of the North American will be called to-day.

"In foreign investments," said Mr. Goldman, "we had been guided by legal advice. He said he had legal advice on the subject. The company had exceeded the amount permitted in the latest ruling of the Insurance Department as far back as 1902.

The United States investments are \$74,091, and reserve \$269,969.

"There hasn't been any contest over this," said Mr. Goldman. "We've never defied the Department. They wrote us one letter in 1906, to which we have replied, and I suppose in a year or two, according to custom, the Minister of Justice will give a ruling."

Commissioner B. L. Kent asked the witness if he was in favor of allowing policyholders to vote.

"Would you then be in favor of amending the constitution and bylaws of the different institutions to give policyholders this right?"

"I would have no objection, but I certainly look on with disfavor any interference of the charter whereby any seconded of a scheme by getting

bodies of policyholders together could capture the company."

"Did you ever hear of any company but your own giving five votes to every \$100 stock?" asked Mr. Kent, "and it goes to give the shareholders fifty times the voting strength of the policyholders?"

"It is a very good provision for us," said Mr. Goldman.

"I have no least doubt of that, but is it fair to the policyholders?"

Mr. Goldman thought that he could not reply to this.

"Would it not be better?" asked Mr. Kent, "if you were to say to your intending policyholders, 'We don't know how you would vote, so we won't give you a vote at all!'"

"Well, policyholders do not take any interest in annual meetings."

Mr. Kent took up the debating evil, after which Mr. Goldman addressed the commission on what Parliament ought to do.

Mr. Langmuir asked if an insurance company shareholder should have greater scope of investment than a trustee.

"I should certainly say so," said Mr. Goldman. "We have to make more money."

Mr. Helmhuth's cross-examination of the witness did not last but a few minutes, and no further points were brought out.
