THE WATER COMMISSION.

Has Instructions of a Wide Nature From the Government.

Toronto, July 7.—The instructions to the recently-appointed power commission are of a much wider nature than was at first supposed. The official document naming and outlining the duties of the commission provides, in addition to the outline of their duties already given, that they are to ascertain the rates or prices that would require to be charged consumers of hydraulic or electrical power in order to meet all expenditure of maintenance and operation and to ascertain the savings that would accrue annually to consumers by the substitution of such rates for the rates now paid.

The commission will also ascertain the actual cost of existing hydraulic and electrical power undertakings, the capacity, state of development, quantity of power supplied and contracted for, the rates charged and to be charged, the actual value of such undertakings, and the estimated capital, if any, necessary to complete such undertakings.

Funeral of Dr. Johnston.

Sarnia, July 7.—Sarnia was in mourning yesterday, all places of business and industry being closed out of respect for the late Dr. Johnston.

M. F. Hunders visited the residence, where the body lay in state, the casket banked with floral offerings. The streets in the vicinity of the house were crowded before the hour of the funeral, and the procession was the longest ever seen in Sarnia. The funeral was under the auspices of the Masons, of whom there were over 300 in attendance. Right Worshipful Bro. Judge Daniel F. MacWatt conducted the Masonic portion of the services and Rev. Canon Davis of St. George's Episcopal Church officiated at the house and grave.
