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S.O.E. AND M.U. HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL WITH CELEBRATION OF DOMINION DAY

HUGE CROWD GATHERED AT EXHIBITION GROUND—LENGTHY SPORTS PROGRAMME

Never before in the history of this city has such a successful day of sports been held on Dominion Day as was experienced yesterday at the Exhibition grounds. Never before was such a gigantic fete and gala ever undertaken by any local fraternal society and S.O.E. and I.O.O.F. M.U. of Brandon are worthy of greatest praise for the way in which they labored to make yesterday the great and grand day that it was.

Thousands of spectators turned out to witness the lengthy programme of sports which began at 3 p.m. and lasted until 9:30 p.m., the grand stand being during the afternoon taxed almost to its capacity. The weather conditions were simply ideal and the beautiful foliage of the park afforded a most appealing background for the sports. Many extra entries were made on the grounds which is another indication of the enthusiasm and sportsmanship of the crowd.

No one did more to make the day a success than the Brandon City band. With the exception of a few short intervals they kept up almost a continual strain of entertaining music and at the end of the sports they played for the dancing, finishing up with the National Anthem.

Following are the results of the day's shoot:

The team shoot for the Brandon grand challenge cup went to the Dundurn Sack club with a score of 87 out of a possible 100. Brandon came second with 86 hits. In this event there were two teams from Brandon, one from Dundurn and one from Boissevain.

ENGLAND VICTORIOUS IN FOOTBALL MATCH

FIRST INTERPROVINCIAL MATCH YESTERDAY GOES TO "ROSE" BY 3 TO 2

England and Ireland clashed last night at the College grounds in the first provincial international match ever played in Brandon and the result was a win for the former by the close score of 3-2.

The score practically represents the run of the play, although the Rose secured a three goal lead before the Shamrock opened their account. Up to this point the match had been a lifeless one, and beyond the usual partisan cries, the fairly large crowd had not shown anything approaching enthusiasm. The English team were the better balanced side, and deserved their success. The Brandon representatives did all the work which was asked of them in good style, although neither men played in their true club form. As an exhibition of the finer points the game was disappointing.

Started on Time

The match started punctually to time, and Rogers having won the toss for England elected to kick with the sun at his back. Referee J. Forbes lined up the following teams:

England—Simpson (Norwood Wanderers) goal; Williams (Britt) and Francis (British United Brandon); Dale Davis (Bons of England); and Coates (Brandon Imps.); Kershaw (United Western); Warner (S.O.E.) Rogers (Norwood); Airey (Celtic); and Parsons (United Western).

Ireland—J. Thompson (Ulster); Watt (Knox); G. Thompson (Ulster); Kerr Beattie Calvert Doherty, Gorman McConell Wright (Ulster); McEwan (Celtic).

Kershaw, the old Brandon boy and Warner took the places of Cartwright and Bradshaw injured on the English side and Thompson replaced McMeekin on goal for the Irishmen.

Immediately after the kick-off Ireland by means of good combination narrowly missed the opening score Williams clearing at the crucial moment. England went

to the other end and gained a corner which was unproductive. Some fairly good combination on the part of the Irish forwards nearly brought about the downfall of the English goal but McEwan was slow in shooting and a good chance was lost. Francis stopped another ugly rush and then England took up the running. Watt however, proved a stumbling block, and easily dispossessed Rogers. He sent the ball well up the field and Gorman should have scored but he stepped over the ball, and Williams had an easy task. The English defence was very severely tried and had the Irish forwards shown a little more cohesion they would have given Simpson an anxious time. As it was Francis and Williams were easily able to break up any threatened danger.

From a long centre by McEwan Gorman had a good chance but hesitated and Coates robbed him. Kershaw received from Rogers and appeared to be going well when he was smartly stopped by Calvert, who however foolishly fouled the ball with his hands. From the resultant free kick England looked like opening the scoring but Rogers passed to Warner when he should have shot and a splendidly conceived movement was spoiled. Thompson saved a certain goal by running out and half saving a shot from Warner the ball went off his arms at a tangent for a corner and had he stayed in goal he would have been beaten. The corner was cleared after some pretty head work in front of the English goal. McEwan got away and centred but the ball went too far forward and Simpson kicked away.

The First Goal

Soon afterwards England opened the scoring the ball was placed by Coates to the outside left who ran through and centred to Warner, who shot. Thompson partially saved but could not prevent the ball rolling into the net. Half time arrived with England leading by 1-0.

England opened the second half with a swing and for a time Simpson was merely a spectator. Rogers came along

in great style, and after some pretty passing a shot from him hit the foot of the upright and rebounded on to Thompson's arms who cleared. It appeared as if the ball had crossed the line but the referee decided otherwise. However it was not long before England increased the lead.

Second for England

Warner scoring after Thompson had saved from Rogers. Some argued that the ball had not crossed the line before Thompson got it away but the referee who was well up that no hesitation in pointing to the centre. It did appear as if Thompson effected a smart save as he turned the final shot but he was obviously standing over the line.

Rogers Got Third

For a time England played up strongly Rogers scoring a third goal from a pass by Warner who had dribbled half the length of the field.

Irish Score Quickly

Undaunted by this further reverse the Irishmen now began to have a larger share of the play, and after several good attempts McConnell opened their scoring with a good shot. This seemed to put new life into the efforts of their forwards and before five minutes McConnell had scored again. The goal followed good combination on the left wing. Hereabouts the English halves who had played splendidly seemed to give way for a time, but from now until the end they had no difficulty in holding the Irish forwards. A splendid run and centre by McEwan was cleared by Francis, and at the other end Kershaw centred to Rogers who should have shot but lost a great chance by passing to Warner. The latter was in a very awkward position but made a great attempt causing Thompson to concede a corner, which was badly placed by Kershaw.

Responding to the cries of their supporters the Celts tried hard to equalize, but the English defence was sound. Both Francis and Williams played strongly and Simpson easily cleared fine long shots from McEwan. At the other end a tardy clearance by Thompson from a centre by Kershaw almost brought about the downfall of the Irish goal but Watt stepped in, in the nick of time, the end was soon called with the scoring remaining at three to two for the Englishmen.
