

## PREMIER PUGSLEY'S BUDGET ESTIMATES SMALL SURPLUS

The Optimistic Premier Still Places His Trust in Securing the \$2,000,000 Fisheries Claim—Expects G. T. P. to Buy the Central Railway—Teachers to Wait for Their Advance for the Present—Increased Provincial Subsidy All Earmarked.

**Premier Pugsley's Budget.**

Premier Pugsley last evening began his Budget speech. He said in part: In rising to discharge the duties which does not ordinarily belong to an Attorney General it may not be amiss that I should call the attention of the House to some of the important incidents that have occurred in previous years, particularly during the time that my predecessor, the Hon. Mr. Tweddle, was Premier. In many years past the office of Provincial Secretary has been filled by gentlemen of great ability and it will soon be filled by another gentleman who now sits beside me, Hon. Mr. Robinson, who will I am sure satisfy the public in that regard. It cannot be expected that I should go into the accounts in great detail.

I propose first to take up an important speech that was made by the Lieutenant Governor at the opening of the House in 1902, at a time when our prospects were not so bright as they are now. That speech held out hopes which I am proud to say have since been largely justified.

**Eastern Extension Claims.**

In that speech a number of matters of great importance were referred to. One of these was the Eastern Extension Claim. The claim arose at a time when the Conservative Government was in power at Ottawa. It was pressed without success for many years and during part of that time the leader of the Opposition sat in the House of Commons. While the Conserva-

tives remained in power we were unable to make any progress. Our claims were turned down by a change of government. In the administration of Dominion affairs and in that speech we were able to announce that the handsome sum of \$275,000, had been paid in settlement of this claim. We also announced that we were pressing our Fishery Claim and our claim to a share of the Halifax Fishery Award. We have pressed these claims and they are still under the consideration of the Dominion Government. If we ever get the opportunity of taking our case before a competent tribunal I have not the slightest doubt that our claim will be recognized and that we will receive a sum in the vicinity of \$2,000,000. We also called attention in that speech to another important matter, the condition of the branch railways. I am happy to be able to say that at a convention recently held in St. John the Hon. Mr. Emmerson announced it to be part of his policy to take over such branch roads and make them part of the Intercolonial.

**Provincial Subsidies.**

We also referred to the adjustment of the Provincial subsidies. The Quebec Resolutions which were sent to Ottawa in 1887, but until 1892 no step had been taken but this Government communicated with the Government of Quebec and at a convention held in the City of Quebec in 1902 the Resolutions were reaffirmed. As a result Sir Wilfrid Laurier has introduced a resolution for an address by both houses for such a change in the British North America Act as will enable the subsidies of the Provinces to be increased. New Brunswick will now receive an addition of \$139,000 to the amount of its subsidy. The leader of the Opposition in a speech he made at the beginning of the session said we should not have accepted this readjustment. He has charged us with sacrificing the interests of the people. Before I get through I intend to invite him to move a resolution that we should not accept this sum of \$139,000. That is the course he should take if he is really sincere in his statement.

**Approves of Premier Whitney.**

I desire to acknowledge the generous conduct of the Hon. Mr. Whitney, the Premier of Ontario, who, although he is not in sympathy with the Dominion Government, and did not altogether approve of the Quebec Resolutions, said that he would not stand in the way of a settlement. The new arrangement instead of confining the subsidy of Quebec and Ontario to the population as it was in 1861, will give them 50 cents a head until their population reaches 2,500,000. That is certainly not an unfair arrangement. When the population of these provinces reach two and a half million 50 cents a head will be paid for the excess. A new arrangement with regard to the provincial subsidy for the Civil Government and Legislation is very generous. The smaller provinces Ontario receives \$240,000, or about 11 cents a head on its population at the census of 1901. Quebec receives the same sum, equal to 14 cents a head. Nova Scotia \$180,000 or 41 cents a head, and New Brunswick \$180,000, or 54 cents a head. Thus this province receives nearly five times as much per capita as Ontario and four times as much as Quebec.

**Willing to Take Whatever Was Offered**

The leader of the Opposition said in his speech at the beginning of the session that Mr. Tweddle and myself said we would agree to no settlements on account of the subsidies unless the Halifax Award was settled also. I challenge my non-friend for honesty of this statement. We never cherish such an absurd idea as to refuse this subsidy because another claim was not settled. Let it be understood by the people of this country, by the school teachers, who want more salary, by those who are asking for more money for roads and bridges, by those who are asking for money for technical education that the leader of the Opposition thinks we should not take this addition to our revenues of \$139,000. We are glad to get that sum and that the people of this country will be glad to get it, for it means an addition to their capital at four per cent of \$3,250,000, which is almost equal to the total amount of our net debt.

**Receipts and Expenditures.**

The hon. gentleman here read over the figures of receipts and expenditures of the past year and then proceeded to say: "The magnificent sum which we received from territorial revenue shows the great value of our province. The lumbermen are interested in preserving the forests and conserving this great source of revenue. In 1896 the receipts from game were \$352.09 and in 1906 they were \$27,070. In eleven years they make a total of \$129,970.00, while the expenditures on that account were \$96,732, leaving a handsome surplus of \$24,237. The receipts from the fisheries in eleven years amounted to \$115,868, leaving a surplus over expenditure of \$96,945. We estimated the receipts from the Dominion government on account of the cost of wharves at \$7,500, but we did not receive so large a sum.

We have an arrangement with them by which they are to pay half the cost of the wharves on the tidal water of the St. John and its tributaries. During the present year we expect to receive the amount due us in full.

### Refund of Fishery Leases.

Another item which we did not get was \$13,189 for refund of fishing leases. This claim arises from the Dominion government having taken possession of a river which we had leased to private parties. We claim that they should indemnify us for the rental. The claim is a fair one and we will continue to press it. In this connection I am glad to inform the House that the Dominion Government are fully impressed with the desirability of getting all fishery questions adjusted as soon as possible. Not only has the Provincial Government claims on the Dominion, but private riparian proprietors whose rights were interfered with have also claims which we will urge upon the government.

### Immigration Question.

With regard to the question of immigration the government is fully alive to the desirability of securing emigrants, but they must be of the right kind. The best would be those who have some knowledge of woodcraft. We have an arrangement with the Salvation Army to pay them three dollars a head for each person they actually settle in the province, and we have a similar arrangement with a gentleman in St. John who has also brought out a number of emigrants.

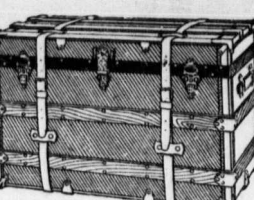
