Farmers are Interested(Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen at Stirling,

Now let me look at this thing from another angle. I said that in 1910 we needed \$125,000,000 of revenue. I said today, if we are going to keep our heads above water, we have to collect every year \$450,000,000 of revenue. Now then, what I put to you is this: If a tariff of 25.76 per cent, the lowest the Laurier government had, is not too high a tariff for revenue purposes only when you need \$125,000,000, how is a tariff of 23 per cent, too high for revenue purposes when you need \$450,000,000 of revenue? I want to know where these people who are going to reduce very substantially a 23 per cent. tariff on dutiable goods, and a 14.8 per cent. tariff on all goods, I want to know where these people who are going to wipe out \$100,000,000 of revenue are going to get the money required. They do not tell us in the House of Commons. If any of you ever heard a resolution in the House of Commons, or read it in the Press, urging upon Parliament another method of taxation, I never did. I know some imaginary substitute in what is called the Farmers' platform; but these people in Parliament have taken mighty good care never to move the Farmers' platform there. Why, they have sat silent as the grave through three sessions. I have stood in Parliament and challenged them to put every man on record. Yes or No, and since I did they have had a dozen chances to do so, but not a man of them ever got up. The only government that ever went into the field of direct taxation with any energy and any result is the government that is in office today. Last year we collected by direct taxation from companies making more than usual profits, from corporations and from the larger incomes of this country, \$81,000,000 of money. We have put on sales taxes and luxury taxes now. Some people do not like them. Don't ever expect that you will like any tax. Nobody ever does. Did we get any help from these people who want to tear down the tariff? No. They fought us every inch of the way. Every tax was wrong, either too late or too soon, too big or too small; there was nothing right at all. The level of the luxury tax was too low; you could not please them with anything. This Government will collect this year, according to anticipation, not less than \$181,000,000 in direct taxation. The government that went out of office in 1911 collected nothing, or nearly nothing. Yet those men who, without collecting any direct taxation, declared they had to have 25.76 per cent. of customs tariff, say that we, who have already collected \$81,000,000 in direct taxation, are robbers of the people because we

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have a 23 per cent. customs tariff. It seems to me the eyes of even the blind and innocent would be opened. I do not see how they stand behind their position for a moment. They do not. I can understand the man who is absorbed with this theory of free trade, the man who has been reading books instead of studying facts and has been honestly carried away with the fetish. That is one class, and that is the biggest class, of those who oppose the present Government policy. But I cannot understand the man who declares himself a free trader and at the same time declares that he would never support the necessities of manufacturing industries if he came into office, who never did ignore them when he was in office, who knows you cannot ignore them and hold this country together. I cannot understand that man unless he is a mere faker. And I tell you this: the opposition to the Administration on tariff policy is composed of two main divisions—first is the free trader, and second the fiscal hounding. I mean the man who tells you, in order to gain the votes of people who know better in this country, that he never for one moment would adopt free trade, and still runs side by side with the wreckers in order that he can join hands with these fellows afterwards, get the vote of all classes of opinion in the country, go into power, and then betray them all. That class of man I call the fiscal hounding. If this Government should be defeated and whatever you may think today, you will not have much fear of its defeat if you wait three or four or six or ten months from now—if this Government should go down, I say here that the party that would be in office would be dominated by the men who, inspired by class consciousness, driven by ambition, led astray by distance from the real facts, have swallowed this principle of free trade. They would be in the ascendancy, along with those who are ready to take hold of free trade, or Socialism, or semi-Socialism, or Redism or anything else, in order to hurl down any government in power. That is the class who would dominate the Administration if the present Government were defeated; and every single element of that class is a wrecking and puller-down, and could never do anything to take us forward and upward.

The financial policy of this Government is to go in debt no farther. The financial policy of this Government is to get revenue to carry on the work of government and to pay our debts.

The tariff policy of this country is to keep Canadian working men in Canada. When you find working men's houses put up in hundreds for sale, you will soon find hard times for everybody. The policy of the Government is to enlarge the employment market and add to the size of Canada. The policy of the Government is to make goods here and keep people here with plenty of work for every class of man. The policy of the Government is to give Canadian industries of every kind just enough advantage in the Canadian market as to make it pay them better to stay here and expand than to diminish their plants or leave.

We are starting now an inquiry, the most thorough we can make, to determine what is absolutely necessary to secure these ends. Wherever there is a tax or schedule that is not absolutely necessary, it will be wiped away. WE INTEND TO SEE THAT NO INTERESTS, HOWEVER POWERFUL, GET MORE THAN THOSE REQUIREMENTS. WE INTEND TO SEE THAT NO WRECKERS OR THEORISTS, HOWEVER ENTHUSIASTIC, IMPERIL THE WELL-BEING OF THIS COUNTRY BY BLINDLY FIXING LESS.

I have dealt strongly and at some length on the wisdom of reasonable duties on imports as a factor in the industrial development of Canada, but there is something else which just now is even more important to consider. I refer to the feeling of unrest prevalent in this country, as in other countries in a greater degree; the tendency to find fault with every Government, to instil prejudice, to tear down existing institutions, to undermine principles which lie at the root of British forms of administration and to oppose everything permanent and tried, with conflicting groups of thought.

This is perhaps natural; at least, it is the recurring consequence of great wars. The world at such times seems to become topsy-turvy. Such movements as the Bolshevism of Russia and the Jaquerie and Jacobinism of France, the I.W.W. and O.B.U. of America get a strong foothold, threatening all established institutions.

We have in Canada, in addition, the ambitions of political groups to gain an ascendancy, irrespective of the interests of others to whom they are opposed. Of course, no group will admit its purposes are selfish. As I have already pointed out, such conditions do not inure to national cohe-

sion, unity and strength. They are essentially destructive.

The attitude of mind is unreasonably critical and censorious. Nothing that a government can, or will do, is satisfactory. The people in the towns grumble at the high prices of farm produce. The farmers grumble at the high prices they have to pay for products of the town. The ordinary business man is complaining of the burden of taxation—federal, provincial and municipal. In the midst of it all, the Reds, the Socialists and the One Big Union are carrying on an insidious campaign in their lodge rooms, by means of spoken and written propaganda, with the object of destroying everything not of their class, just as Bolshevism in Europe is wrecking nations and seeks to overturn the whole world.

The state of Russia today is worse in respect of despotism and dictatorship than it ever was under the worst Czar that reigned. The Baltic nations are hopelessly involved in revolution, conspired with the strike of 'opposing groups. Some other nations are little better. Bolshevism in Russia, which does not represent the views of one-tenth of its population, is maintained by a standing army by sheer force; and that under a system of democracy which is supposed to be opposed to militarism, to despotism and all forms of tyranny.

IN THESE DAYS WHEN THE WORLD IS IN A CONDITION OF FLUX, WHEN TRADING CONDITIONS ARE SERIOUSLY DISTURBED, AND THEIR FUTURE COURSES INCAPABLE OF BEING PREDICTED, WHEN THE CURRENCIES OF ALL COUNTRIES ARE INFLATED, WHEN NEARLY ALL THE IMPORTANT NATIONS ARE OVERWHELMED WITH WAR DEBTS, WHEN FEW MEN AND FEW NATIONS QUITE KNOW THEIR OWN MIND, WHEN THE PEOPLES OF THE WORLD ARE STILL REELING FROM THE AWFUL TRAGEDY AND SHOCK OF THE WAR, AND ARE FEELING GROPPING FOR LIGHT, WHEN THE CREDIT SYSTEM OF THE WORLD, AROUND WHICH ALL PRODUCTIVE INDUSTRY REVOLVES, IS ENDANGERED, AND WHEN IN MANY COUNTRIES THE RULE OF LAW AND ORDER IS ANNULLED AND THE RED HAND OF PHYSICAL FORCE APPEARS AS A DISTINCT MENACE TO CIVILIZATION, IT IS SURELY LITTLE SHORT OF MADNESS TO THINK OF DEPARTING FROM TRIED AND PROVEN POLICIES WHICH HAVE SUCCESSFULLY STOOD THE TEST OF TIME. WE CANNOT AFFORD TO SAIL OUR NATIONAL CRAFT IN UNCHARTED SEAS.

I STAND FOR UNITY IN CANADA, FOR SOLIDARITY OF CONDITIONS AND FREEDOM OF ENTERPRISE WITHIN OUR OWN BORDERS, THE LESSON FOR CANADA AND THE FREE PEOPLES OF THE BRITISH EMPIRE IS TO AVOID THE PITFALLS OF ALL THE NATIONS WHICH HAVE PRECEDED IT AND SUNK INTO OBLIVION, AND OF THOSE AS WELL THAT ARE WRITHING IN CHAOS AND SUFFERING. I SHALL STRIVE WITH ALL MY POWER FOR NATIONAL UNITY, EMBRACING ALL RACES, LANGUAGES AND CREEDS. I SHALL FIGHT WITH ALL MY ENERGY FOR NATIONAL SOLIDARITY, FOR MODERATION OF THOUGHT AND ACTION, FOR ORDERLY PROGRESS, FOR MAINTENANCE OF LAW AND ORDER, AND FOR POLICIES WHICH HAVE BROUGHT US WHERE WE STAND.

My aim and object will be to hold the balance fairly and firmly among all classes, and to see, as far as that is possible, that the maximum of profitable labor may be given to all our people, and that they may be encouraged in the idea which I consider the foundation stone of national success, that intelligent effort shall always be suitably rewarded, that the men and women of this country may rise in stature and improve their minds and their material condition according to the measure of their honest endeavors. These I conceive to be the highest aims of statesmanship. I shall oppose with every legitimate weapon at my command and with every ounce of my power the forces of destruction and disruption, the force that in this and other lands wishes to tear down the structure of responsible government and destroy the fabric of civilization wave through centuries of toil and care. I want to see Canada a great, a peaceful, and a united people.

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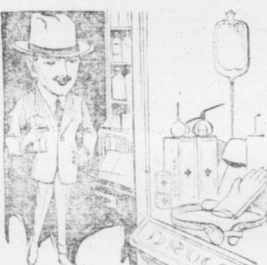
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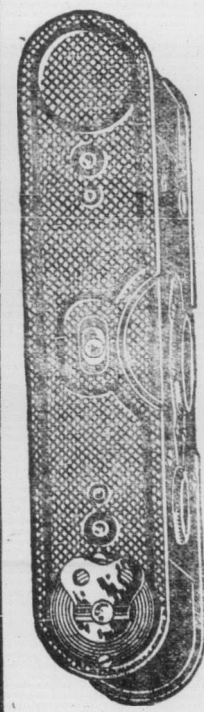
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
