TRADES TROUBLESThe Strike Now Involves Every  
Branch of Building Trades;  
It Is SaidBoston, Mass., March 16.—The  
building trades labor troubles were  
extended today when lumber team-  
sters, handlers and tallymen, number-  
ing 400, walked out in most of the  
lumber yards of the city.  
A reduction in wages and refusal  
by the dealers to treat with a union  
committee were said to be causes of  
the strike action.  
Virtually every branch of the build-  
ing trades now is involved in the dis-  
turbed situation.U. S. RAILWAYMEN  
VOTING TO STRIKEAssociated Press by Leased Wire.—  
Boston, Mass., March 16.—More than  
98 per cent of the six hundred em-  
ployees of the Boston, Revere Beach  
and Lynn Railroad have voted to  
strike in protest against the wage  
reduction announced for tomorrow.  
Grand Lodge officers of the "Big Five"  
railroad unions announced after com-  
pleting the count of the ballots.  
The unions officers said before call-  
ing the strike they would officially  
notify representatives of the road of  
the men's decision and would confer  
with them again in an attempt to get  
a reconsideration of the wage re-

usually pay back double.FASHION'S DECREE  
IN WOMAN'S DRESSThe Ease With Which The New  
Paris Modes Can Be Adapt-  
ed to American TasteAssociated Press by Leased Wire.—  
Paris, March 16.—A return to con-  
servatism in woman's dress is indi-  
cated in advance displays for Spring  
and Summer now being held in Paris.  
Several hundred American buyers  
who have arrived for the season-  
al fashion shows are more pleased  
than they have been since the armis-  
tice because of the ease with which  
the new modes can be adapted to  
American taste.The Paris dressmakers continue  
to show extreme effects in afternoon  
and evening wear, but the majority  
of the gowns reflect a return to sim-  
plicity in dress. Such is the view of  
American buyers. Buying, however,  
restricted because of the general de-  
pression in the United States.  
The business lull in America has led  
to purchase of the most quiet  
models, the theory being that Amer-  
ican women during the coming season  
will buy only simple things  
which can be worn on many occa-  
sions.  
The season is only half finished,  
but a general indication has already  
been given of the changes. One of  
the most noticeable innovations is  
the lengthening of skirts at least  
one inch. French dressmakers ad-  
mit that this is a recognition of  
American taste which has resented  
the extremely short skirt since it  
was introduced.  
Bucks are still bare. This the  
dressmakers have refused to alter.  
American buyers are purchasing these  
"bareback" models with a view  
to rigidly modifying them in Amer-  
ica.While the new gowns are less  
radical, buyers say they continue to  
be complicated and expensive. With  
the reappearance of dyes of a pre-  
war standard, color dominates all  
gowns. The material may be simple  
but gold and silver and blue and pink  
trimmings are combined to make it  
attractive. As one buyer described it,  
"modern simplicity implies ex-  
pense, old fashioned simplicity dull-  
ness."Prices continue high. Dressmakers  
justify them by pointing to the ar-  
tistry involved in their creations and  
also to the fact that materials used  
were purchased at top prices.  
For the eastern buyer of beauty the  
season offers much. There are drap-  
eries and turbans of all variety of  
color and long strings of beads of  
all colors of the rainbow. Beads are  
to be worn extensively according to  
the arbiters of fashion.  
The corset has again been ignored.  
So serious and consistent has become  
this coolness to what was formerly  
fashion's basic principle, that cor-  
set manufacturers are contemplating  
an extensive campaign to bring the  
corset back into its proper place.  
Paris dressmakers say that corsets  
"are simply impossible." If one de-  
sires the utmost in smartness,  
feathers play a most important  
part in the new hats. Ostrich plumes  
in particular are being used on large  
hats. Hats for the most part are  
small, and are worn crushed down on  
the head in many shapes.Fruit is invading the realm of  
fashion. Bunches of fruit and flow-  
ers are worn at the waist and some  
of the new hats have belts of roses  
around the waist. Flowers are ex-  
tensively used in many other com-  
binations.  
The prophecy of fuller skirts is  
being fulfilled, but surely coming true, ac-  
cording to buyers. Although it is not  
yet fully realized, the season's  
gowns are somewhat wider.  
The frail shoulder strap, upon  
which so much depends, persists in  
the new creations. The dressmakers  
say they have strengthened it, so as  
to avoid "embarrassing complica-  
tions," but men buyers say it still  
has dangerous aspects.
