SUMMER DESSERTS.

CHOCOLATE CREAM.—Make a
boiled custard, using three eggs to a
quart of milk, dissolve two squares
of plain chocolate over hot water and
slowly stir in and sweeten to taste;
put a level teaspoonful of cornstarch
into a cup and stir with two table-
spoonfuls of cold milk and add this;
beat till smooth and thick. Flavor
with vanilla and cool. Put into a flat
glass dish, add a heaping spoonful
of whipped cream or more, and scatter
over it almonds or other scallies.
Or serve in glass cups.

INVESTIGATIONS RE CENTRAL RAILWAY

FREDERICTON. Thursday.—The
Central railway commissioners this
afternoon examined Deputy Receiver
Babbitt as to the subsidies paid. Evid-
ence showed altogether \$224,000 was
paid. Of this amount \$147,000, with
the exception of \$20,000 paid to Thomp-
son & Sons, was paid to Dr. D. C.
Bertram, New York, manager of the
company that had the contract of con-
struction. Of the other \$77,000, \$32,-
500 was paid in 1903 to the New
Brunswick railway company, which
had taken over the Central Railway.
The money realized on bonds sold to
the Eastern Trust Company, and pro-
ceeds with the exception of \$12,000 was
handed to Geo. W. Allen, Secretary of
the company. The \$12,000 paid the
People's Bank was for advances made
in 1902. The balance of \$44,500 realized
mostly from bonds sold to the Royal
Trust company and the proceeds went
to meet the advances previously made
by the different banks.
Tomorrow the investigation will take
up money paid under bonds guaranteed
by the province.

PRISONERS SENTENCED

MONTREAL, Thursday.—Today was
sentencing day in the Court of Kings
bench, and Justice Tremblay headed

death of a patriot. The charge was
murder at first sight. The warfar-
wards changed to manslaughter.

reau. Alcide Bourgeois, who beat a
grocer named St. Denis out of a thou-
sand dollars in a card game, will have
to spend three years in the peniten-
tiary.

GREAT DAMAGE DONE

GUELPH, Thursday. Thunder storms
which have swept through this dis-
trict during the past couple of days
have been the worst experienced here
for many years and great damage was
done. In the city the telephone sys-
tem has been demoralized and many
of the long distance lines are still out
of order. The brick chimney of the
Crows Iron Works was hit yesterday
afternoon and part of the top fell
through the roof of the engine room,
doing \$200 damage and shocking al-
most every employee of the plant.
That night a bolt struck the chimney,
knocking off the chimney and explod-
ing on the stove. Strange to say one
of the lids of the stove mysteriously
disappeared and it cannot be found.
The house of John Ramsey at Eden
Mills was also struck, the bolt en-
tering by way of the chimney and
seriously shocking a lady guest who
was in the room, as well as doing
considerable damage.

IDYLLS OF THE STARS.

When we look upwards toward the
doomed canopy of the midnight skies
scintillating and flashing in all its
glory, the innumerable, serried array
of starry orbs transcending in many
hued fires, some gleaming in effulgent
splendour, some plunged deep in the
inimitable abyss of space, less vivid
in their consoling lustre, and some,
even further in the profundity of
that mysterious infinity, but more
points of light, we note that the
brighter of these glittering suns are
arranged in fantastic design which by
the exercise of a little imagination
may in some cases be resolved into the
constellations figured on our celestial
globes.

These constellations, or asterisms
were, with a few exceptions, named
by the earliest civilized nations of the
earth, the Chaldeans and early Greeks
especially, in honour of mythical deities
or real personages whose deeds of
valour and heroism they desired to
commemorate. Thus the strange
fable of the birth of Clytemnestra, the
beautiful wife of Agamemnon—whose
death-mask, of solid gold, found in her
sarcophagus, together with that of
Agamemnon himself, may now be
seen in the fine museum at Athens—is
commemorated by the constellation of
the Swan; the mixture of fable and
fact in the legend of the rescue of the
fair Andromeda, the daughter of a
King of Ethiopia, by an imaginary
being, Perseus, who slew the sea-mon-
ster, was about to devour her, has
been handed down from age to
age ever since that dim, far-off epoch
in the early history of the world in the
constellations which bear their names,
and also in those of Cassiopea and
Hercules. Andromeda's parents; on the
achievements of Andromeda, said to be the
inventor of horse-drawn chariots, of
Ophiucus (Esculapius), the god of
medicine, the constellation of the scorpion,
the constellation of the hunter, real or
imaginary it is impossible to say
whose constellations is alluded to by
that ancient writer Job himself; and
the constellation of the universe, a
memorial written in glistening letters
of fire in the skies or heaven of the
achievements, some doubtless fabulous
and legendary, of the mighty heroes
of old.

But there is one gorgeous constel-
lation, perhaps more brilliant and
more magnificent than any other in
the entire expanse of the universe, a
constellation out of the range of vision
of those ancient pioneers of astronomy
for it is far down in the Southern
Hemisphere—the Southern Cross—
which commemorates, and the real or
fancied achievements of poor mortals,
but the wondrous sacrifice of the Son
of God, who on the cross of shame
made expiation for the sins of all be-
lievers, by Himself suffering the pain-
ful end to them. And all who
would gain a certain inheritance in
the Kingdom of Glory have but to plead
that propitiation before the throne of
the Almighty, conforming their lives,
of course, to his laws.

Save Pineapple Parings.

GROVER CLEVELAND DEAD

PRINCETON, N. J., Wednesday.—
Former President Grover Cleveland
died here at 8.40 a. m. today.

The following statement signed by
Doctors Jos. F. Bryant, Geo. D. Lock-
wood and J. M. Carnochan was given
out: "Mr. Cleveland, for many years
had suffered from repeated attacks of
pastor-intestinal origin, and he had
long standing organic disease of the
heart and kidneys. Heart failure com-
plicated with pulmonary thrombosis
and oedema were the immediate cause
of his death."
