NIGHT AND DAY.

The March issue of "Night and Day," the quarterly organ of Dr. Barnardo's Homes, as usual provides interesting reading for the charitable public in its wonderful records of child salvage. It is remarkable that this single institution wonderful records of child salvage. It is remarkable that this single institution (consisting of 140 branches) has under its care no fewer than 8,300 boys and girls who have no parents or guardians to provide for them. That points to some regrettable social conditions, but it is at the same time a cheerful omen in that it implies a great amount of philanthropic and Christian sympathy practically directed toward the rescue of the helpless. The death rate among 3,150 children boarded-out in England alone is only 234 per thousand—simply a phenomenally low statistict.
