And whereas the Act of Incorporation limits the interest to be paid by the City on all moneys horrowed under and by virtue of the provisions of the said Act to five Pounds per centum per annum, which rate of interest it is with good reason feared will prove too low to enable the City to borrow money for City purposes: Be it therefore further enacted, that it shall and may be lawful for the Common Council of the said City, to pay or engage to pay as much as six pounds per centum per annum upon monoy's to be by them borrowed under the provisions of the said Act, provided that such money cannot be had at a lesser rate of interest after due and proper exertions made to obtain it at unch lesser rate.
