## PROVINCIAL PARAGRAPHS

Kent County Council has voted \$1,000 to Moncton Hospital.

Sackville Board of Trade at its annual meeting last week, condemned the Daylight Saving plan.

In the Fredericton Police Court last week an Indian of St. Mary's swore he got drunk on hop beer.

Alexander J. Leggio, of Chatham, has made his assignment for the benefit of his creditors. Sheriff John O'Brien is the assignee.

St. John Council will borrow \$125,000 to provide a new home for nurses, remodel their old quarters for hospital purposes and build a wing to the northern end of the General Public Hospital.

The Province of Alberta has appointed Mrs. R. R. Jamieson as Police Magistrate of the City of Calgary. This makes the second appointment of this nature. Mrs. Arthur Murphy having been placed in charge of women's cases in Edmonton Police Court.

The Women's Institutes of N. B. have donated the balance of the motor Ambulance fund, \$117.50, to the Red Cross work. Lady Tilley has sent \$100 to Paris, where a big Red Cross hospital containing 100 beds is being opened. The balance, \$32.50, will be used to purchase Red Cross supplies.

Jas. S. Neill has been re-elected President of the Fredericton Board of Trade, and R. H. Simmonds is secretary. In his annual address, Pres. Neill praised the Fredericton Board of School Trustees for introducing domestic science in the public schools and urged that steps be taken to have technical education started if only in a modest way. The Board has 66 members.

Over 500,000 autos were sold in the U. S. A. last year.

The trouble between Britain and Norway over coal has been settled. Norway to get coal from Britain.

H. P. Kline of Snyder Co., Pa., who bought a farm three years ago, for \$1,400, recently found in an old stump a pot of money worth \$1,343.

Harry K. Thaw, slayer of Stanford White, and now wanted in New York to answer an indictment charging that he fogged Frederick Gump, cut his throat in a West Philadelphia apartment Thursday afternoon.

The plant of the Canadian Car & Foundry Co., Kingsland, N. J., covering 80 acres and employing 1,400 men making shells, for Russia, was burnt Thursday with a loss of possibly \$4,000,000. Cause unknown. No loss of life.

Robert Hoe, Jr., son of the late Robert Hoe, inventor of the printing press, obtained a decree of divorce at Reno, Nevada, last week from his wife, Mrs. Ethel Louise Dodd Hoe, upon the grounds of cruelty and desertion. Mrs. Hoe did not contest the action.

The Quebec License Victualers and Allied Traders, at their meeting in Montreal last week, decided that they would agree to a law to stop shipments from Quebec to other provinces, where prohibitory laws are in effect, and they claim this should be satisfactory to the temperance people of the other provinces.

The farm production of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta last year was as follows:—Wheat, \$161,389,955; oats, \$22,135,625; barley, \$6,891,187; flax, \$6,851,883; dairy products, \$12,723,614; Winnipeg stock yards, \$69,346,398; Calgary yards \$10,110,770; Edmonton yards (three months) \$618,251; hay, potatoes and roots, \$17,938,000.

In the most sweeping of all decisions upholding prohibition laws, the U. S. Supreme Court has upheld as constitutional and valid the Webb-Kenyon law prohibiting shipments of liquor from "wet" to "dry" States.

It also sustained West Virginia's recent amendment to her law prohibiting importation in interstate commerce of liquor for personal use.

After having been vetoed by President Taft, who held it unconstitutional, and having been re-passed by Congress over his veto, the law was sustained by the Supreme Court by a vote of 7 to 2.

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-  
WEST LAND REGULATIONS**

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price, \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 10 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 100 acres and erect a house worth \$500.

## Allies Clearly State General Objects of War

Washington, Jan. 11.—The translation of the French text of the Entente note, as cabled by Ambassador Sharp at Paris, follows:

"The Allied Governments have received this note which was delivered to them in the name of the Government of the United States on the 19th of December, 1916. They have studied it with the care imposed upon them, both by the exact realization of the hour and by the sincere friendship which attaches them to the American people."

"In a general way they wish to declare that they pay tribute to the elevation of the sentiment with which the American note is inspired, and that they associate themselves with all their hopes with the project for the creation of a league of nations to insure peace and justice throughout the world. They recognize all the advantages for the cause of humanity and civilization which the institution of international agreements destined to avoid conflicts between nations would prevent; agreements which must insure the sanctions necessary to insure their execution, and thus to prevent apparent security from only facilitating new aggressions, but a discussion of future arrangements declined to insure an enduring peace presupposes a satisfactory settlement of the actual conflict."

"Permanent Peace Impossible Now"

"The Allies have as profound a desire as the Government of the United States to terminate, as soon as possible, a war for which the Central Empires are responsible, and which inflicts such cruel sufferings upon humanity, but they believe that it is impossible, at the present moment, to attain a peace which will assure them reparation, restitution and such guarantees to which they are entitled by the aggression for which the responsibility rests with the Central Powers; and of which the principle itself tended to ruin the security of Europe; a peace which would, on the other hand, permit the establishment of the future of European nations on a solid basis. The Allied nations are convinced that they are not fighting for selfish interests, but, above all, to safeguard the independence of peoples, of right and humanity."

"The Allies are fully aware of the losses, and suffering which the war causes to neutrals, as well as to belligerents, and they deplore them; but they do not hold themselves responsible for them, having in no way either willed or provoked this war, and they strive to reduce these damages in the measure compatible with the inexorable exigencies of their defense against the violence and the will of the enemy."

"It is with satisfaction, therefore, that they take note of the declaration that the American communication is in no wise apocryphal in its origin with that of the Central Powers transmitted on the 18th of December to the Government of the United States. They did not doubt, more over, the resolution of that Government to avoid any appearance of a support, even moral, of the authors responsible for the war."

**Analogy Challenged**

"The Allied Governments believe that they must protest in the most friendly, but in the most specific manner, against the analogy drawn by the American note between the two groups of countries. The analogy, based upon public declarations by the Central Powers, is in direct opposition to the evidence, both as regards responsibility for the war, and as concerns guarantees for the future; President Wilson, in mentioning it, certainly had no intention of associating himself with it."

"If there is an historical fact established at the present date it is the wilful aggression of Germany and Austria-Hungary to insure their hegemony over Europe and their economic domination over the world. Germany, proved the declaration of war, by the immediate violation of Belgium and Luxembourg, and by her manner of conducting the war, her contempt for all purposes of humanity, and all respect for small states; as the conflict developed the attitude of the Central Powers and their allies has been a continued defiance of humanity and civilization. It is necessary to recall the horrors which accompanied the invasion of Belgium and of Serbia, the atrocious regime imposed upon the invaded countries, the massacre of hundreds of thousands of inoffensive Armenians, the barbarities perpetrated against the population of Syria, the raids of Zeppelins on open seacoasts, the destruction by submarines of passenger steamers and of merchantmen, even under neutral flags; the cruel treatment inflicted upon prisoners of war, the juridical murders of Mrs. Cavell, of Capt. Fryatt; the deportation and reduction to slavery of civil populations, etc.; the execution of such a series of crimes, perpetrated without any regard for universal reprobatation, fully explains to President Wilson the protest of the Allies."

"They consider that the note which they sent to the United States in reply to the German note will be a response to the questions put by the American government, and, according to the exact words of the letter, constitute a public declaration as to the conditions upon which the war could be terminated."

"President Wilson desires more; he desires that the belligerent powers openly affirm the objects which they seek by continuing the war. The Allies experience no difficulty in replying to this request. Their objects in the war are well known; they have been formulated on many occasions by the leaders of their governments."

**Allied Terms in General**

"Their objects in the war will not be made known in detail, with all the demands for equitable compensation and indemnities for damages suffered, until the hour of negotiations. But the civilized world knows that they imply, in all necessity and in the first instance:

"The restoration of Belgium, of Serbia, and of Montenegro, and the indemnities which are due them."

"The evacuation of the invaded territories of France, of Russia and of Roumania, with just reparation."

"The reorganization of Europe, guaranteed by a stable regime and founded as much upon respect of nationalities and full security and liberty of economic development, which all nations, great or small, possess, as upon territorial conventions and international agreements suitable to guarantee territorial and maritime frontiers against unjustified attacks."

"The restitution of provinces or territories wrested in the past from the Allies by force, or against the will of their populations."

"The liberation of Italians, of Slavs, of Roumanians and of Bohemians (Bohemians, Moravians and Slovaks of Northern Hungary) from foreign domination."

"The enfranchisement of populations subject to the bloody tyranny of the Turks."

"The expulsion from Europe of the Ottoman Empire, which has proved itself so radically alien to Western civilization."

"The intentions of His Majesty the Emperor of Russia regarding Poland have been clearly indicated in the proclamation which he has just addressed to his armies."

"It goes without saying that if the Allies wish to liberate Europe from the brutal covetousness of Prussian militarism, it never has been their design, as has been alleged, to compass the extermination of the German peoples, and their political disappearance. That which they desire above all, is to ensure a peace upon the principles of liberty and justice, upon the inviolable fidelity to international obligation with which the Government of the United States has never ceased to be inspired."

"United in the pursuit of this supreme object the Allies are determined, in individually and collectively, to act with all their power, and to consent to all sacrifices to bring to a victorious close a conflict upon which they are convinced, not only their own safety and prosperity depends, but also the future of civilization itself."
