A most shocking tragedy took place at Belgrade, Servia, on Thursday night last, by which King Alexander and Queen Draga, and several others were worked up in the army against the King and Queen and the Government. The royal palace was raided after midnight, and the King and Queen were shot, as well as Premier Markovitch General Petrovitch and former Minister of war Pavalvitch, and some others. King Alexander was only twenty-seven years of age and was the son of former of a former dynasty, King. A new kinds of reports are in circulation regarding the cause of the trouble. It appears that the king in 1901 abrogated or arbitrarily set aside the constitution under which government proceeded up to that time and this had been a cause of friction ever since in some quarters especially in the army. Whatever may have been the cause, or alleged cause, the tragedy is a most shocking one. The Kingdom of Servis comprises only 18,000 square miles and has a population of 2,500,000. It is separated from Austro-Hungary by the Danube. It was formerly subject to Turkey; but part of the last century. Of those who have been its rulers during the eight reigns of its history, three have abdicated, two have died natural deaths and three have been assassinated.

JOHN A. Inman, who was shot Crown Point by a revolver in the hands of Edward Dunn, on the 7th, inst., died at the P. E. I, Hospital on Saturday afternoon. A coroner's jury viewed the body after death. The inquest was then adjourned to the Police Court room where it was continued on Monday evening. After hearing the evidence of several witnesses the jury returned the following verdict, concurred in by the Coroner, Dr. H. D. Johnson: That the said John Avery Inman came to his death from the effects of a bullet wound fired from a pistoi in the hands of Edward Dunn of Crown Point. Dunn was arrested for the shooting on Monday and brought to the city. He was formally charged before Stipendiary Palmer and pleaded not guilty. He was remanded till yesterday when his preliminary trial took place After the evidence of several witness he was discharged as the shooting was shown to have be accidental.
