St. John's Church.—This week we
-took a look through the above men-
-tioned church. If it were not for the pecu-
-liarity of the pews a person could read-
-ily be deceived as to its being the same
-building as of yore, so completely has the
-work been done. The walls have been
-painted with a new shade of green, with
-a neatly painted border of brown.
-Running the full length of the walls are
-the following Scriptural quotations, on
-either side, "I will pay my vows unto
-the Lord now in the presence of all His
-people," and "Exalt ye the Lord our God
-and worship at His footstool, for He is
-holy." On the front wall may be read
-"Feed my sheep," and "Feed my lambs."
-Over the altar is inscribed "In this
-place will I give peace saith the Lord of
-hosts." The pulpit has been done away
-with and the reading desk brought out
-in front of the altar. The choir is
-placed in the chancel which has been
-neatly seated for them. The communion
-table, is covered with purple baize and
-the altar, chairs, desk, &c. are upholster-
-ed with the same material. Just above
-the communion table is the familiar in-
-scription "This do in remembrance of
-Me," in elegant gilt letters, while over
-the chancel window is "Holy! Holy!
-Holy!" There are also three satin ban-
-ners with gold fringe bearing the texts
-"The Lord reigneth," "God is love,"
-and "Trust in God." The painting was
-done by Mr. Olsson, of Goderich, who is
-well known for his artistic ability. He
-displayed no small amount of taste in
-the work done and can get a recom-
-mendation from the people of St. John's
-Church at any time. F. C. Rogers took
-a very active part in raising the where-
-withal to meet the expense of the work
-done. The church looks very neat, at-
-tractive and comfortable.—[Post.]
