### Constable Fired at Five Times.

A WOMAN'S BRAVERY.  
(Daily Mail, Dec. 27th.)

A police constable endeavouring to arrest a suspected burglar in the Borough during the early morning yesterday found that the man was armed, and while pressing forward on his duty single-handed was fired at five times. Nevertheless he captured the man.

The prisoner, who gave the name Charles Arthur, and described himself as a labourer of no fixed abode, was charged before Mr. Plowden at Tower Bridge yesterday with attempting to break and enter the Virginia Plant, Public-house, Great Dover Street, Borough, and with attempting to murder Police Constable George Haywood, 341st, and further with being in possession of house-breaking implements. The man limped into the dock and was accommodated with a seat, it being explained that he had injured his foot while trying to escape from the public-house.

Police Constable 341st said that at 1 a.m. yesterday he was on duty in Broad Street, Borough, when he heard a police whistle blown. He then saw the prisoner come from the structure adjoining the Virginia Plant and walked towards him. The man commenced to run and the witness gave chase. After going about twelve yards the fugitive stopped, faced round, and fired a revolver at him.

Mr. Plowden: You were not hit, is that right?  
The Constable: No.  
How far off were you when he fired—  
About twelve yards. He then ran down Great Broad Street, but soon he stopped and fired again.  
What distance off were you then?  
About seven yards. He again missed.  
You were in uniform?—Yes. I was then almost upon him, and he fired a third shot. I caught him by his coat and right wrist, and he fired his revolver for the fourth time.  
None of those shots touched you?  
No, sir.  
The constable, continuing his narrative, said he sought for help. A woman, Frances Wright, of 51 Great Broad Street—ran towards him. He asked her to blow his whistle, and with great courage she managed to get possession of it. The prisoner was struggling most violently, and he had the loaded revolver in his hand. Not only did she blow the whistle, but she struck the prisoner again and again in the face.

**Miraculous Escape.**  
The man contrived to release his right hand, the constable said, "and pressing the muzzle of the revolver against my forehead, he pulled the trigger. There was a click, but no shot—the revolver had got jammed."  
The woman was still blowing the whistle and helping to hold the prisoner. A sailor, Henry William Barber, of 37 Pepper Road, came up, and the witness asked him to help. The sailor at once seized the struggling man, and between them they held him until the woman's whistling brought assistance. Eventually the police had to protect the prisoner against the violence of the crowd.  
Mr. Plowden: You seem to have had no more miraculous escape. I do not suppose anyone in the world has been fired at five times without being hit. I think you deserve great credit for the courage you displayed in sticking to the man. I congratulate you upon your escape.

### An Interesting Debate.

Calls for assessments have been made and collected for Bros. Simpson, Miller, Hiscock, Rankin, Taylor and Garland, the several beneficiaries paid in accordance with the rules, beside bonus, as provided by resolution passed at the annual meetings.
