Laying Foundation Stone at Bay Roberts

On Wednesday, July 12th, the foundation stone of the new Parish Church of St. Matthew, was formally laid by the Lord Bishop of Newfoundland. The little town of Bay Roberts, and its inhabitants alike, both seemed to realize that this was an important occasion and regarded it as such. During part of the afternoon the shops were closed and bunting was much in evidence.

The Lord Bishop, accompanied by Canon Noel and Smith, arrived by the afternoon train and held luncheon at the Rectory. The weather was all that could be desired, and although the sky presented a threatening appearance several times, no rain fell either to mar the ceremony or to dampen the ardour of the loyal church people of Bay Roberts.

At 3.30 p.m. the clergy robed at the house of Mr. Mercer, those present besides the Bishop and Canon Smith and Noel being: Revs. G. H. Field, E. C. Clench, E.E. Rustad, J. S. Adams, and the Rector, W. Coates-Booth. Two lay-readers, Messrs. Norman and Moulton also being in the procession. After all had robed the clergy took up their position on a platform erected for the occasion.

The prayers used at the ceremony of this kind were said by the Rector, and a hymn was then heartily sung by the large gathering which were present.

Mr. Azariah Duce of Bay Roberts had previously given a handsome silver trowel to be used at this ceremony and which was now presented to the Bishop. It was inscribed with the following:—"Presented to the Lord Bishop on the occasion of laying the Corner Stone of the Parish Church of St. Matthew, Bay Roberts, 12 July, 1911."

The New Treaty With Japan.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day. The Anglo-Japanese Alliance has been modified to exclude the States from the possible enemies of Britain, and the life of the Alliance has been extended nearly six years by the new version of the old treaty which the Foreign Secretary, Sir Edward Grey, and the Japanese Ambassador, Count Kato, signed at London yesterday. The original agreement which was signed on August 12th, 1902, included eight articles and a preamble. The only practical difference between the new version and the old treaty is the embodiment of the following article:—"Should either high contracting party conclude a treaty of general arbitration with a third power, it is agreed that nothing in this agreement shall nullify such contracting party's obligation to go to war with the Power with whom such treaty of arbitration is in force."

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-Day.

British politics at the present moment bear an interesting aspect. No-body doubts that the Veto Bill will be carried in the last debate in the House of Lords. The only question remaining is whether the Lords will carry their opposition to the extent of forcing the wholesale creation of peers. This would be a suicidal policy because if the Veto Bill was passed without such a creation of peers, the House of Lords would still retain the effective power of delaying legislation, such as is contemplated in that bill. This would be lost to the Tory party, if the creation of peers established a permanent liberal majority in the Upper Chamber. Hence there is an almost universal opinion that the Lords will yield at the last moment. The fate of the Unionist party itself is however engrossing more attention than the fate of the Veto Bill. After three successive defeats at the polls the party appears to be torn by internal dissensions. From present appearances a situation exists which is likely to end in an attempt to dethrone Mr. Balfour from the leadership.

Special Evening Telegram. ROME, July 14. The Pope, in view of the increased cost of living, has issued an encyclical to Catholics, with the object of helping the working and salaried classes. The Pope has decided to abolish the obligation to hear Mass on the days dedicated to St. Joseph and St. John, and on Corpus Domini day, which henceforth will be solemnized on the nearest Sunday. Roman Catholics must continue to attend Mass on Sundays, Christmas Day, New Year's Day, Twelfth Day, Ascension Day, All Saints Day, the Feast of the Conception, St. Peter and St. Paul's Day. If any such feasts fall on Fast days, a dispensation from fasting will be granted.

Special Evening Telegram. WASHINGTON, July 14. An agreement to vote on the Reclamation Bill on Saturday next, July 22nd, was reached by the Senate today. The agreement fixes the vote on the House Wool Revision Bill for July 28th; Free List Bill, Aug. 1st; Reapportionment Bill, August 3rd; Statehood Bill, August 7th. It is expected that the adjournment of Congress will immediately follow the Statehood vote.
