

Big Battle Expected.

LONDON, Noon. A despatch from Shanghai states that the Republic has been proclaimed at Wu Ching. A strong force of rebels has left Hankow with the object of engaging Imperial troops coming from the North. A big battle is expected within two days. It is reported that conflagrations have broken out in the native city at Hankow and that the Government buildings have been destroyed.
