LONDON, To-day.

The Dock strike, conducted peacefully up to the present, assumed a disquieting aspeet last night, by reason of the issuance of a manifesto on behalf of strikers, protesting against the use of police and soldiers in the employers' interests and warning the Government that such action will provoke extreme measures on the part of strikers and imperil the peaceful conduct of the dispute. This manifesto is due to the fact that throughout the day hundreds of tons of meat were unloaded by volunteers underpolice protection. It is reported that the strike committe in secret session decided if the Government resorted to the employment of troops, the decided if the Government resorted to the employment of troops, the strikers would retaliate by stopping the Royal Mall Service, which ran uninterruptedly throughout the strike of 1911. The probability of the strike becoming national is increased by the belief that the carmen's strike will be a partial failure and because of the Workers' Federation at Liverpool, Manchester, Glasgow, Southampton and other ports ordering men to refuse to handle the cargoes of such vessels.


