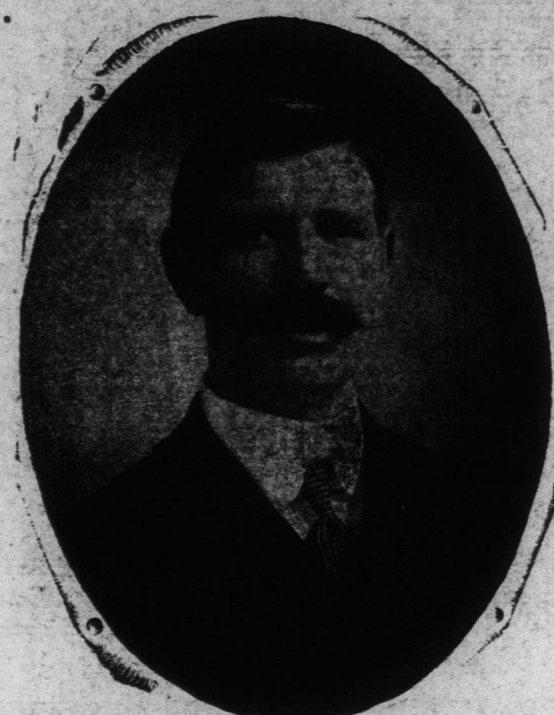

The West's Awake!

Campaign Opened

in St. John's West.

Messrs. Ellis, Cowan and Scott

Acclaimed as Future Rep- resentatives of the District.

Committee Hall Too Small for Tremendous Concourse --- Mor- ris's Seat in Jeopardy.

Never before in the history of St. John's West, was there held a meeting so enthusiastic, so loyal and so determined as that which assembled last night in the West End Committee Rooms, for the purpose of choosing the Liberal candidates for the coming campaign. Rooms on George St., capable of seating two hundred and fifty people, had been hired for the use of the committee, but so great was the crowd at 8 o'clock, that standing room was at a premium and both George and Adelaide Streets were lined with people, so much so, that in order to accommodate them arrangements had to be made for the hire of the T. A. Hall, where it was then announced the meeting would be held. Thereupon the crowds forming up in a body proceeded to the T. A. Hall, making the hills re-echo with

Cheer upon Cheer for Sir Robert Bond and the Liberal Party.

On arrival at the Hall, Mr. P. Lacey was moved to the chair and the meeting was called to order. It was proposed, seconded and approved that Mr. E. Leo Carter act as Secretary. The Chairman then stated that the object of the meeting was to select candidates to uphold the Liberal banner in the District of St. John's West, after which a committee would be formed to manage the details and conduct the campaign. In a speech brimful of enthusiasm, and amidst bursts of thunderous applause, Mr. E. F. Carter proposed and Mr. Jacob Bishop seconded that His Honour Mayor Ellis, Messrs. H. E. Cowan and J. P. Scott be chosen as candidates for the Liberal Party in the

district, and the motion being put was carried amidst prolonged cheering and the wildest enthusiasm.

Mayor Ellis then thanked the Meeting for the honor conferred upon him. He had always been a staunch supporter of the Liberal Party and he hoped to continue so. He believed in a good, clean fight, free from personal abuse and discreditable tactics and for his part he would so conduct it. After the applause accorded Mr. Ellis had ceased, Mr. Scott addressed the meeting and in a most enthusiastic speech, punctuated with cheers, scored the extravagance and bungling of the present Government. Then followed the speech of the evening. For nearly three quarters of an hour, with an

Eloquence and Forcefulness Unsurpassed, Mr. Cowan Spoke of the Wrongdoing of the Morris Regime.

With well-drawn comparisons he showed up the almost criminal extravagance of the Railway Contracts and the non-performance of many of the wild-cat schemes which had formed so important a plank in the Morris manifesto. From all sides he could hear of the great change of sentiment in St. John's West. The people, disgusted with the Morris regime, had rallied round the banner of the old-time Liberals and he did not doubt but the Hills would speak in no uncertain tone and that the returns would show an overwhelming victory for the Liberal candidates in St. John's West. The formation of a committee then began and on the Chairman calling for volunteers, out

of the six or seven hundred who composed the meeting, fully

Three-quarters came forward to follow in the footsteps of their forefathers and enrol themselves under the standard of the Liberal Party. Cheer after cheer broke from the ranks and well might the onlooker have said that this was a different committee from that which formed up in 1908. Here was a committee against which there was no withstanding. Here was a committee full of the grit and the determination to win. Here indeed was the committee which is going to reset more firmly than ever the Liberal sentiment of St. John's West and return triumphant the three Liberal Candidates. Messrs. Ellis, Cowan and Scott.

Never before did Morris see a greater omen of defeat than last night's meeting.

The thunderbolt has fallen. The handwriting is on the wall and now, at last, after twenty-five years of blinding and deceit, twenty-five years in which he filled his pockets with the wage of the people:—

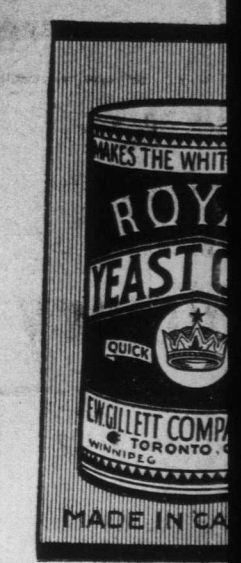

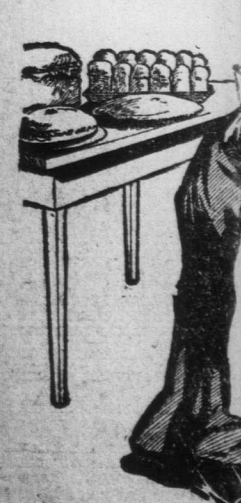
