





LONDON, To-day. A fair degree of quiet has continued on the war fronts during the past 24 hours. None of the oft repeated threats of big offensive in France has yet actually materialized. Persistent reports of a Greeco-Bulgarian encounter, resulting from a Bulgar surprise attack have been cleared up by a Greek statement. The encounter took place in Albanian territory. No one was killed, and but a few were wounded. It is announced from Paris that no enemy detachment has yet crossed the Greek frontier. Meanwhile work on the defensive lines around Saloniki is being actively pushed. Greek villages in the neighbourhood of the lines are being evacuated by the populations.
