### BRITISH OFFICIAL

Action on the Cambrai front during the night has been confined to patrol encounters, in which we captured prisoners. The enemy's artillery has shown increased activity on both banks of the Scarpe River. The Admiralty announces that on the 6th December naval aircraft carried out bombing raids on St. Denis, Westram and Angel aerodrome. Bruges dock and various railway trucks were observed to explode and damage caused amongst sheds and ships. All machines returned safely. In the course of the usual fighting by patrols two enemy aircraft were destroyed, and more were shot down completely out of control; three of these are probably destroyed.

Italian Official.—On the Asiago, the battle is continuing uninterruptedly.
