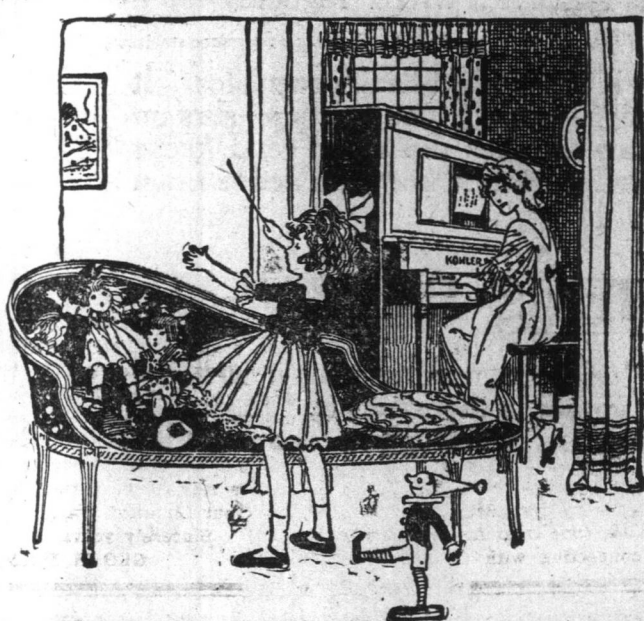

**Vessel Had
Terrible Time.**

CREW'S FIGHT FOR LIFE LASTED SIXTY HOURS—MATE WASHED OVERBOARD.

The members of the crew of the schooner Metamora, which arrived by the S. S. Kyle on Saturday, tells of the trying time experienced before the vessel had to be abandoned. The Metamora left Lisbon, salt laden, on Dec. 18th for this port. After being out nine days a heavy storm was met, and the vessel had to heave to. For six days little or no progress could be made, and on January the first another fierce storm from the west and north broke on the vessel. Heavy seas were running, causing the ship to strain. At 4 p.m. the foreboom broke in two and the foresail was carried away. The vessel was obliged to run before the wind under bare poles. All hands were now ordered to the pumps. Everything on deck was smashed to matchwood and a small boat broke loose from the main hatch, drawing the rings out of the deck, and plugs of wood had to be made to fill the holes to keep the water from the cargo. The foredeck was strained and leaking badly. No fires could be lighted, owing to the wreckage lying across the range funnel. On the 2nd day of January the mate, while trying to repair an old fore stay sail, was washed overboard and drowned. On the 3rd day, the weather moderating a little, double reefed mainsail, double reefed foresail, and fore stay sail were set and the ship headed for Azores. At about 6 p.m. it was found that the vessel was leaking badly and an examination of the pore peak, showed that she would have to be abandoned. The pumps were kept going until, on Jan. 4th, after 60 hours' continuous work, the exhausted crew were compelled to give up. The S. S. Lagos, bearing down on them, took the crew to St. Michael's, in the Azores.
