### WHEN NOT TO ARGUE.



Isn't it extraordinary how a fit of anger and resentment can alter one's whole set of values, one's whole outlook on life?

### Food in the Sea.

### OCEAN BED MORE PRODUCTIVE THAN DRY LAND.

Dr. W. A. Herdman, Professor of Oceanography in the University of Liverpool, in his presidential address to the British Association at Cardiff, made an urgent plea for more knowledge of the life of the sea and the mysteries it carries from its surface to its depths, six miles below. He concluded with an argument in favour of taking a sort of census of the population of the sea. "It has been shown," he said, "that the common edible animals of the shore may exist in such abundance that an area of the sea may be more productive of food for man than a similar area of pasture or crops on land. A Lancashire mussel bed has been shown to have as many as 16,000 young mussels per square foot, and it is estimated that in the shallow waters of Liverpool bay there are from 20 to 200 animals of sizes varying from an amphipod (sand flat) to a plaice on each square metre of the bottom."

### Mystery of Eels.

The mystery of the eels was also referred to by Dr. Herdman. The eels, he said, live and feed and grow under our eyes without reproducing their kind—no spawning eel has ever been seen. After living for years in immaturity, at last, near the end of their lives, the large male and female yellow eels undergo a change in appearance and in nature. They acquire a silvery colour and their eyes enlarge, and in this bridal attire they begin the long journey which ends in maturity, reproduction, and death. From all the fresh waters they migrate in the autumn to the coast, from the inshore seas to the open ocean and, still westward and south to the mid-Atlantic, and we know not how much further—for the exact locality and manner of spawning has still to be discovered. The youngest known stages of the Leptocephalus, the larval stage of eels, have been found by

the Dane, Dr. Johannes Schmidt, to the west of the Azores, where the water is over 2,000 fathoms in depth. These were about one-third of an inch in length, and were probably not long hatched. The "elvers," or young eels, are carried by North Atlantic drift back to the shores of Europe, and ascend our rivers in spring in countless myriads.

## Mending the Broken Cross.

There was recently held on the top of the hill of Vaudemont, on the plain of Lorraine, a unique ceremony, partly religious, but chiefly patriotic.

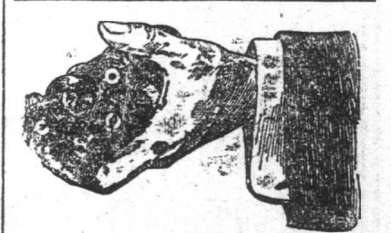
The hill was the site of the castle of the Dukes of Lorraine and of the Emperors of Austria. From its top a hundred villages and small towns can be seen and naturally it has been selected as the scene of many ceremonies.

In 1873, after the peace had condemned Alsace and Lorraine to German ownership and government, 49,000 Lorrainers gathered on top of the hill and laid before the shrine of Notre Dame de Sion, protectress of Lorraine, a broken cross with the inscription "It is not for ever."

At the recent celebration, attended

by the Bishops of Metz, Nancy, Strassburg, Verdun, St. Die and Luxembourg, Senators and Deputies from all over Lorraine and thousands upon thousands of pilgrims, there was first an open air mass, after which the broken cross was bound together with a gold wire, the old inscription was taken off and replaced with a new one, "It is forever," and the cross was laid at the foot of the shrine.
