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



No Such Thing as Sound.

Really there is no such thing as sound at all. We call vibrations treble or shrill sounds. The deepest

vibrations produce a corresponding is produced by thirty-two vibrations motion in the air, with strikes on the per second. The sharpest treble sound drum of the ear, and gives the sensation of sound. Touch the bell with your finger and you stop its vibrations. The sound-waves in the air at once cease, and you hear no sound.

Different vibrations cause different 'sounds"-using the word in its usual sense. Musical sounds are the regular and uniform succession of vibra tions. Some sounds are sonorous and sound, or more correctly, it is a bad pleasing, others are "dead."

The difference is due to the quality of the sound-originating substance. A hard and elastic substance like copper or iron will give vibrations which come to the ear pleasantly.
