Churchill Reserves Statement.

Irish Discussion Inopportune at the Moment—Rio Grande-River Rises Forty-five Feet—Residence of Ulster Premier Attacked.

INOPPORTUNE.
LONDON, June 20. Winston Churchill told the House of Commons to-day that the present time was inopportune for a discussion on Ireland, and asked the House to allow him to reserve any statement he would have made on Thursday until a later date.

RIO GRANDE OVERFLOWS.
LAREDO, Texas, June 20. Hundreds of Mexicans were rendered destitute, scores of houses swept away, and much live stock lost when the Rio Grande reached the crest of forty-five feet here to-day, and spread over the low-lying country.

THE RESULTS SO FAR.
DUBLIN, June 20. Forty-four Coalition Pro-Treaty members and twenty-five Opposition Republicans have been elected in the Irish Parliament, according to latest returns.

REPUBLICANS DEFEATED IN DUBLIN.
DUBLIN, June 20. In the Irish elections in Dublin the

BELFAST, June 20. Officials are reticent, but it is believed an attack on the castle was frustrated by the guard.

PROGRESSIVE AMENDMENT DEFEATED.
OTTAWA, June 20. Conservatives united with Liberals to-day to defeat an amendment sponsored by Progressives to reduce the proposed British preference on blankets.

Dodging a Cyclone.
WIRELESS ENABLES LINERS TO GET OUT OF THE WAY.
The value of wireless was proved in a cyclone which lately swept through the Bay of Bengal. The approach of the storm was first recorded at the seismograph observatory in Calcutta, and the information was passed on to the wireless station at Fort William, which spread broadcast information concerning the cyclone. While the cyclone was rapidly travelling north messages were sent out every three hours warning shipping of its course, speed, and intensity. No fewer than 8 big ships were able to get out of its track, while the news was picked up by 450 wireless stations in Bengal. The storm was one of the worst known in the Bay of Bengal for many years. At Fort Blair there was eight inches of rain, and the average velocity of the wind was in the neighbourhood of 100 miles an hour.

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Plane Carries Plane.
Experiments with a remarkable type of battle plane which carries its own scout machine poised at the tip of one of its wings have been carried out at Farnborough, England. Two big bombing planes have been flying over Aldershot with a miniature airplane fixed to the upper wing. So far it is understood that the tests have been successful. The parent machines have travelled at their usual pace, although the engine of the scout machine was kept running so that it was ready to dive off at a minute's notice to protect the larger and heavier craft. An expert pilot is carried by the bombing plane and as soon as his services are required, he climbs through the top wing and takes his seat in the scout plane. By pressing a trigger he frees the smaller machine, which at once glides smoothly along the battle plane wing and dives off.
