Less Liquor

Used in Quebec

THAN IN THE "DRY" PROVINCES
OF THE DOMINION.

Montreal, July 24.—That the people of this Province are drinking considerably less liquor than are the people of the "dry" Provinces under the prescription system, appears on figures just issued. Total of sales by the Quebec Liquor Commission for the past year was valued at \$15,000,000 in British Columbia with a population about one-fifth that of Quebec and where the liquor situation is much the same as here, total sales for the year reached \$14,000,000. Further, it is said, there are many more visitors to the Quebec Province than to British Columbia.

Counting the thousands of Americans who come by road and rail into Quebec, a sale of about \$3,000,000 of liquor, the proportion sold to foreigners does not represent a great deal at an average charge of \$4 a bottle.
