REBELS WILL NOT DISCUSS PEACE.
GALVESTON, Tex., Dec. 23. Emphatic denial that overtures for a peace parley will be entertained by the De La Huerta Government was contained in an official despatch from Alvarez Delcastillo, Secretary of Foreign Affairs for De La Huerta, at Vera Cruz, received here today by Adolfo Jimenez, the rebel agent, yesterday appeared at the De La Huerta headquarters in the field and entered the rebel fold with all his men, according to dispatches received from Vera Cruz.

LEVIATHAN WILL LAY UP.
NEW YORK, Dec. 23. The Leviathan, the largest American merchant ship, which went aground on a mud bank off Staten Island, Friday, will be laid up for the winter at her pier in Hoboken, N.J., it was announced Saturday. This, it is said, is not because of the accident, but in accordance with pre-arranged plans for laying up the steamer during the slack period.

FREE STATE PRISONERS RELEASED.
BELFAST, Dec. 23. Four hundred prisoners were released from the Free State detention camp at Newbridge, Saturday, and a large number from Carragh Camp. There will be further releases on Monday, it is learned, and it is expected that on Christmas the camp will be practically empty.

U.S. AMBASSADOR SAILS.
NEW YORK, Dec. 23. Former United States Senator Frank B. Kellogg, from Minnesota, sailed Saturday to take up his post as United States Ambassador to Great Britain.

A TRIPLE MURDER.
COOPERMILLS, Maine, Dec. 23. Three sisters were shot to death in a lonely cabin here on Saturday and their alleged assailant, John Snow, husband of one of the dead, is believed to be dying from a self-inflicted wound.

WANT PORTS CLOSED TO U.S. FISHERMEN.
PRINCE RUPERT, Dec. 23. Representatives of halibut fishing boat owners and fishermen at a meeting here, decided to ask the Federal Government to close Canadian ports to United States fishing boats, as being done on the Atlantic Coast, under the abrogation of the modus vivendi.

Inspiring Meeting of B. and F. Bible Society

AT HARBOUR GRACE.
The Harbour Grace Branch of the British and Foreign Bible Society, held a public meeting in St. Paul's Hall on Sunday afternoon. The meeting opened at 3 o'clock. Mr. A. J. Goodland, president of the local branch, occupied the chair, and there was a capacity audience. On the platform were:—Rev. E. M. Bishop, Rector of Bay Roberts; Rev. W. B. Bugden, Methodist Minister, Carbonara; the two speakers for the afternoon; Rev. W. R. J. Hight, Rector of St. Paul's; Rev. W. E. R. Cracknell, Incumbent of Christ Church; Rev. F. S. Coffin, Pastor of the Presbyterian Church and Capt. Rideout, of the S. A. Citadel, also the members of the committee. An addition of three members to that committee was made before the programme of the afternoon was commenced. After the hymn "Stand up, stand up, for Jesus" had been heartily sung, which was followed by prayer, led by Rev. F. S. Coffin, and Scripture Reading by Capt. Rideout, S.A., the chairman then addressed the meeting, stating the object of the society and amongst other remarks, gave some information relative to the Hr. Grace Branch. He then introduced the first speaker, Rev. E. M. Bishop, Rector of Bay Roberts Parish. His eloquent address was listened to with rapt attention, and when the rev. gentleman had concluded, one and all must have been thrilled by his words, and felt a deeper, keener, interest in the work of this wonderful Society. If we cannot send the "living missionary" to the dark, benighted corners of the earth, we can, at least, do our bit by our sympathy, our prayers, our dollars, and thus pass on to others the story of the Messiah, the message of hope, of immortality, through the "little printed Missionary"—the Bible. When the hymn "Lord Thy Word Abideth" had been sung, the second speaker was introduced, Rev. W. B. Bugden, Pastor of the Methodist Church, Carbonara. And, again the large audience was favored with an inspiring address, which was listened to with the keenest and best attention. The object of the Society was given, viz:—"To place into the hands of every person a copy of the Bible, written in his own particular tongue, at cost price." Why withhold from others that which has been the means of enriching our lives, let them know the truth, "and the truth shall make them free." The statistics as to what has been done by the Society was also given by the Reverend gentleman and it is pleasing to note that in this great world-wide work in the cause of humanity, Harbour Grace is doing its little share. And, as the speaker concluded, the hearts of the hearers, again were stirred to do more in the future. A vote of thanks was then ably proposed by Mr. Edward Parsons, (in the absence of the Rev. Mr. Harris) to the speakers, who had added some extra work to their busy day, by coming along to address the meeting, the pianist, Miss Chafe; the car owners, for their part, and for all who made Sunday afternoon's meeting such a success. This was duly seconded by the Rev. W. J. Hight, and put to the meeting by the chairman—the audience showing their accord by standing. To this, Rev. Mr. Bugden briefly replied, and on behalf of Rev. Mr. Bishop (who had to leave shortly after he addressed the meeting) thanked one and all for the appreciation shown. And, with the singing of the hymn,—"All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name,"—a very inspiring and successful meeting of the Hr. Grace Branch of the British and Foreign Bible Society.
