JOHN HORSMAN. Poisoned by Paper Collars.—The Lacon Home Journal says that Judge Bangs, of that place, "who for some times has been under medical treatment at the Konosha water cure, says his disease was caused by wearing paper collars, into the composition of which arsenic largely enters." Such cases are much more common than is generally supposed. The arsenic is used to give the highest glossy, polish on what are known as "glazed" collars.
