A MAN KILLS HIS SON.—We learn from the Rev. J. F. Farley that Mr. Elias Spurgeon, living some five miles south of Ravensara, in Mercer County, killed his son, William Spurgeon, on last Friday. The two were digging potatoes together and had some falling out, when the young man struck at his father with the hoe. The blow was warded off, but repeated by the son, when the father caught the hoe and jerked it out of the son's hand and struck him on the head, fracturing the skull. There was not a more respectable, peaceable, and Christian family in the county.—Trenton (Mo.) Republican.

Madrid, Oct. 7th.—General Moriones, announces a great victory of his troops over a large body of Carlists, near Argazura, in the province of Navarra. Many of the insurgents were killed, and a large number taken prisoners. The rout is complete, and the forces are in close pursuit.

A column of 2000 insurgents made a desperate sortie from Carlhagena to day, but was driven back with heavy losses in killed and wounded.
