THE WEATHER PROPHECY.

Toronto, Aug. 22-11 p.m.—The storm
center has moved quickly with diminishing
energy from the western part of Quebec to the
Gulf of St. Lawrence, and high pressure has
spread to the lake region from the Northwest,
bringing cooler weather. There is now an
area of low pressure over the Northwest Terri-
tories, accompanied by high in the Mar-
time Provinces, and fine in other parts of the
Dominion. Minimum and maximum tem-
peratures: Calgary, 42-72; Prince Albert,
32-70; Qu'Appelle, 42-72; Saskatoon, 38-66;
Winnipeg, 41-70; Toronto, 52-65; Montreal,
56-68; Quebec, 55-68; Halifax, 54-69.

Toronto, Aug. 23-1 a.m.—The indications
for the next 24 hours for the lower lakes
region favoring the peninsula and as far
east as Belleville are: Moderate winds; fine,
cool weather.

Tenders Let for Supplies.

A meeting of the Hospital Trust was held
in the City Hall yesterday afternoon, the
members present being Col. Lewis (chair-
man), Mayor Taylor, and Trustees Compin,
Gilmore and Pardon. The auditor's
statement was received and filed. Mr.
Wm. Gartshore's communication respect-
ing the support of Mr. Barlow in the hospital
was referred to Mayor Taylor with power.
Following contracts for hospital sup-
plies were awarded: Messrs. John Lawson,
groceries at 13 cents off the schedule rate;
John Scandrett, liquors; David Carroll,
milk, 34 and 33 cents per quart; J. Ran-
som, bread, 34 cents per pound; J. J.
Smith, fish; Stanton & Co., ice, 363; A. E.
H. Jolliffe, beef and mutton; B. Baldwin,
coal, at \$5 30, \$5 34 35 for grate and egg,
soft and steam lamp; P. A. Rowat & Co.,
tea. It was decided to call for new tenders
for butter and eggs, the one received being
high. The Board then adjourned.

Toronto Opinion of London's Fair.
