Scored a Great Success.
The Lucknow Sentinel thus refers to several city performers at a late Orange concert in that place, of which the proceeds were \$115: "Miss M. T. Stephenson, of London, gave the solo, 'Should He Upbraid,' and with her sweet, well-trained voice and pleasing style completely captivated the audience and was loudly cheered."

No Room for the Ambulance.
The police commissioners met in Chief Williams' office Wednesday. A request from the City Council that the hospital ambulance and the patrol wagon be kept together was not entertained on the ground that there was no room for another wagon at the patrol stables. Messrs. Smith and Westman take the places of Messrs. Woolway and McGowan on the police force. Mr. Smith, hails from the vicinity of Cherry Grove and Mr. Westman is a nephew of A. Westman, of Craig street. P. C. Crawford will act as train officer until it can be otherwise arranged.

Searching for the Lost.
A search party was organized the other day to Port Dover to discover, if possible, the lost yacht Mabel and its occupants, Major Emerson and A. E. Bunker. The steamer W. M. Alderson was chartered by Messrs. Longmore and Reid, since Mr. Bunker, Toronto, and M. A. Dillon, of this city, who went over to the Port and interviewed parties there who had seen the Mabel last, among them, Captain Woodward, the light keeper, and his son, but no definite information could be got. The party then searched about the bay in different directions without avail, and sadly returned from its fruitless search. A reward of \$1000 has been offered for the recovery of the bodies and \$50 for the recovery of the yacht. As the bodies have now been in the water long enough to float they will probably soon be found, as many mariners are on the lookout for them.

The Ontario Express Company.
The case of the Ontario Express Company in their endeavor to force the Grand Trunk Railway to afford them the same facilities over their lines as is granted the Canadian and other express companies was settled so far as the Montreal courts are concerned by Judge Wurtelle Wednesday. Early in the spring the Ontario Express Company existing by virtue of a charter obtained some time ago was reorganized, and on May 1 they applied for privileges of transportation, but were refused by the Grand Trunk. Hence the writ of mandamus. The most material witness examined for the defense was Mr. Wainwright, assistant general manager of the G. T. R. He testified to the fact that the company had 3,500 miles. There are seven express companies operating over the company's system. The Canadian Express Company is accommodated with complete cars and a portion of a large number of other cars. The other companies are furnished with portions of cars only. The facilities of 25 cars for the Canadian Express Company represent a cost of \$75,000, and it would probably cost about \$150,000 to duplicate that company's whole service for another company. With the present very heavy traffic an additional express service would require additional trains on some portions of the line, such as between Montreal and Toronto, each train representing a cost of \$350 to \$400 for running expenses. To give accommodation to a new express company at the present moment would exceed \$100,000. With the work now on hand in the shops it would take many months to duplicate the service. In fact it could not be done at all at present. With nothing on hand the service could be duplicated within two months. Another express could not be carried with the present trains, and witness informed Mr. Chadwick and Mr. McKay of this. The G. T. R. Company never contracted with the present petitioners to its wisest knowledge. After a brief deliberation Judge Wurtelle quashed the writ, ruling that the proper tribunal to inquire into the difficulty and adjudicate upon the matter was the Parliamentary Railway Committee. The case fell within their jurisdiction and should be submitted to them. The action was therefore dismissed, reserving the plaintiffs' rights to other recourse.

ROBINSON'S GREAT CIRCUS.
Immense Crowds at the Performances—The Spectacular Exhibition One of the Greatest of the Season.

John Robinson has every reason to be satisfied with his success in London, and those who attended his splendid exhibitions must have the same feeling towards his circus. The object of the first Canadian tour is to establish a reputation in this country and pave the way for future appearances. As far as London is concerned that purpose has been accomplished, and hereafter Robinson's show will receive a hearty welcome.

If the attendance in the afternoon was comparatively large, that of the evening was extraordinarily great. The vast interior of the big tent was a sea of faces, and the attendance is estimated at between 6,000 and 7,000. The opening production was a very novel and interesting one. The circus was without doubt the richest thing in the spectacular line ever seen in this city. It represents Oriental splendor in all its gorgeousness and magnificence. Several hundred people in variegated uniforms and glittering armorial appendage in stately movement, with a bewitching ballet of surpassing numerical force, are the first impression on the senses, enhanced by brilliant realistic scenic effect and dazzling illumination. The excellence of the ballet in particular elicited repeated applause. The spectacular in a circus was a novelty to the majority of those present, and the beauty of the scene impressed all beholders. Incidentally the ceremonies attendant upon the arrival of the Queen was a grand parade around the ring, which, for imposing numbers and effect, has so far been unsurpassed.

Three rings were in simultaneous and varied operation. The hippodrome performances involved some exceedingly clever and daring bareback riding, the feat of the pretty acrobatic circus receiving well-merited recognition. In the equine department Robinson's circus is probably excelled by none. The number of
