A COLTS' LEAGUE.

SMOKESTACK SPARKS.

Don't Allow a Garinshaw—Relieving the Demand for Cars in the East.

There are now 125,000 bushels of wheat in the new G. T. R. elevator at Portland.

The C. P. R. has reduced passenger rates 1 cent a mile on a number of its western branch lines.

The C. P. R. has received 32 carloads of new rails, which will be used on the line east of Toronto, and on the Montreal and Ottawa section.

Mr. R. Ryder, formerly of Lucan, Ont., who has been for some time assistant agent at Virdee, Man., has been promoted to be agent at Mooseley, N. W. T.

Now that the freight business in the Northwest has slackened somewhat, the C. P. R. are sending down additional rolling stock to relieve the scarcity of cars in Ontario.

A circular has been issued by Mr. Charles Perry, the treasurer of the G. T. R., and countersigned by General Manager Hays. The circular calls attention to the fact that by a recent provision of the law in Quebec, when garinshaw proceedings are instituted against an employee of the company, the latter is compelled to go through certain formalities, and states that compliance will entail so much additional expense, trouble and risk of loss upon the company, that in future any employee who allows his wages to be seized for debt will draw upon himself the penalty of dismissal, unless he makes an arrangement with his creditors before the writ is returnable, and that the provision will be strictly enforced. The treasurer also complains that the number of garinshaw writs served upon the company in the Province of Ontario make it necessary to enforce the same rule there. Employees are directed that the proper time to protect their interests in this respect is when the judgment is given and not when the writ has been served.

THE THORN MURDER TRIAL.

New York, Nov. 18.—It is promised that there will be no delay on the part of either prosecution or defense in the Thorn trial, which will be re-begun next Monday. Mrs. Mack declines to talk on the Guldensuppe murder without the aid of an interpreter. The missing head is being searched for, and is believed Mrs. Mack knows where it is.

TEN DEER AND A BEAR.

Guelph Herald: A hunting party from Puslinch, consisting of Messrs. Alex. and C. P. Seubauer, J. Cockburn, J. Fife and W. Little, returned on Tuesday evening, after a three weeks' outing in the Moon river district. The party were very successful, and brought back ten deer, each having shot two. They are very fine specimens. During last week three of the party, while on the hunt, ran across a black bear, near Buckhorn Lake, which had succeeded in killing, after a hard fight. The animal weighed 317 pounds, and was sold on the way home to a gentleman in Toronto. The party state that the vicinity in which they were is overrun with sportsmen, and a great many had returned without seeing a live deer. A very fine deer also arrived in the city this morning, addressed to Mr. George Shortreed.

The Sternaman Trial.

Testimony of the Undertaker's Son and the Prisoner's Brothers.

A Letter of the Husband Explaining His Periodical Attacks of Fits.

Cayuga, Ont., Nov. 18.—The trial of Mrs. Sternaman on the charge of murder was resumed yesterday, the court room being crowded after the death of a woman was cool and composed.

Snider, son of the undertaker who prepared the body of G. H. Sternaman for burial, was the first witness. He swore that the body was not embalmed or punctured in any part. This he swore by the amount that was charged on the books.

Two brothers of the deceased were next called. They swore that the prisoner was the only one who had given medicine to Mr. Sternaman, except in one instance, when some tea and toast was given by his mother.

J. E. Dew, Buffalo, agent for the John Hancock Mutual Company, testified as to meeting the prisoner after the death of her husband, when she asked him not to say anything about the \$1,000 insurance, as the relatives might get it from her.

Mr. Fairchild, United States commissioner, swore to the evidence of the prisoner during the extradition proceedings.

A letter of the deceased's was also read, explaining his periodical attacks of fits, and saying that if he should die suddenly it would be by reason of them, and not by the hand of his wife, as might be supposed. This was dated June 10, 1896.

Dr. Seltzman said he visited the deceased in Buffalo. He was very ill. When attending deceased he never suspected arsenic. He had Addison's disease in mind, and said that if there had been any arsenic used it must have been after the patient had left him. The condition of the patient when he was called was consistent with arsenical poisoning, and the condition of the patient after death, if it had not been embalmed, would indicate that arsenic had been given within 48 or 72 hours before death.

Mr. Fairchild, resident claim inspector for the insurance company, said he visited prisoner's house and had a conversation with her as to the death of her first husband. At first she said he had died of typhoid fever, and afterwards she said she had heard that there were suspicions of her murdering him, and that she ordered an autopsy to be held on George H. Sternaman account of the report that was around about her first husband.

Dr. Rich, of Buffalo, was called to testify as to the last illness of the prisoner's first husband, Ezra Chipman.

Mr. German, counsel for the defense, strongly objected to digging up the first husband at this stage of the proceedings, as it had nothing to do with the present case.

Judge Armour ruled that this evidence was admissible, and the doctor testified that Chipman's symptoms were gastric vomiting, intense thirst, and later numbness and paralysis. It might have been caused by arsenic or any other irritant poison, or it might have been caused by cholera. He did not consider it a case of poisoning at that time.

Dr. Farmer, who attended Chipman during his illness, thought his death might possibly have been caused by poison.

After recess the reading of the evidence taken at Buffalo during the extradition proceedings was taken up, there being 489 pages of type-written copy. It details the life, sickness and death of Chipman, the prisoner's first husband, and also that of George H. Sternaman.

TRAGEDY AT STRATFORD.

Grand Trunk Employee Killed While Coupling Cars.

Stratford, Ont., Nov. 18.—While coupling cars about 3 o'clock yesterday morning, David Dryden, a yardman in the employ of the Grand Trunk Railway, met with a fatal accident. An east-bound yard freight was being made up, and Dryden was in the act of coupling a van onto a coach, when he was caught in the chest by the drawhead, which slipped past and carried him about three car lengths. He was taken to a near-by office, and medical assistance summoned, but nothing could be done to relieve the unfortunate man, who died about 4 o'clock in the afternoon. He leaves a wife and one child three months old.

OVER AN EMBANKMENT.

Kansas City, Mo., Nov. 18.—Train No. 2, on the Kansas City, Fort Scott and Memphis Railway, which left Birmingham Wednesday evening for Kansas City, was derailed just west of Wilford, Ark., at 3 o'clock this morning. The combination coach, chair car and sleeper went over the bank, the combination car going into Spring River. The chair car and sleeper were both burned. One passenger was fatally injured and 22 others more or less seriously hurt.
