The city is compelled to improve its sewerage by the civil courts, which have pronounced judgment on the 2nd of September, and that the city must improve its sewerage.

The plan proposed is the work of three of the best sanitary engineers in the Dominion, and has the approval of the United States, and has the approval of the Provincial Board of Health.

Should the future requirements of the city demand other means of sewage disposal, the present expenditure will only be increased half a mill on the dollar. The man who pays \$10 taxes will have to pay \$12 more.

BALFOUR AND GLADSTONE.

London, Sept. 1.—Right Hon. A. J. Balfour has terminated his visit to Mr. Gladstone at Hawarden, which place he left yesterday afternoon.

GET THE ADVANCE.
London, Sept. 1.—The Clyde and Belfast shipbuilders have settled their differences with their employees by conceding the advance in wages demanded by the men.

REVOLT RENEWED.
London, Sept. 1.—Advices from Manila say that the separatist revolt in the Philippine Islands has been renewed, and that a state or siege has been proclaimed in Manila.

CARDINAL SATOLLI'S SUCCESSOR.
Rome, Sept. 1.—Rev. Sebastien Marinelli, who was recently appointed to succeed Cardinal Satolli as delegate of the Roman Catholic Church in the United States, was consecrated a special archbishop in the presence of the foreign diplomats accredited to the Vatican. The ceremony of consecration was performed by Cardinal Rampolla, the Papal Secretary of State.

CRAZED IN PRISON.
London, Sept. 1.—It is reported that John Puff, another of the Irish political prisoners, has become dangerously insane. Albert George Whitehead, the insane Irish-American dynamite, recently released from Portland prison, who on the night of Aug. 24 escaped from the home of relatives at Skibbereen, and disappeared, has been traced into the mountains beyond Barmouth, where his trail was lost. The parties which were organized to search for him have given up all hopes of finding him, and have returned home.

THE NILE EXPEDITION.
London, Sept. 1.—The advance of the British expedition up the Nile has been seriously retarded by the un-expected weather during the past week. Heavy rains swept the advance camp with hardly any warning, and a sand storm, followed by a thunderstorm, demolished hundreds of huts and tents, destroying twelve miles of the new railway and cutting off telegraphic communication with the front for several days. Many soldiers had narrow escapes, and the tents of the Intelligence Department were overturned, and confidential papers were scattered over the desert. Many of the documents were lost, and it is hoped they will not fall into the hands of the Dervishes.

THE SULTAN'S CONCESSION.
London, Sept. 1.—Reliable information has been received at Athens from Constantinople to the effect that the Sultan has accepted the proposals of the powers for the future government of Crete, with the addition that concentration of civil and military powers shall be in the hands of a governor-general, who is believed to be the Cretan Vahby Pasha and Chakir Pasha have been appointed military commanders of Pera and Galata respectively, with stringent orders to restore quiet. The commission appointed by the Minister of Police to inquire into the revolution of the 19th of May, and the Cretan Christians and eight Muslims, is sitting at the Ministry of Justice. Four hundred Muslims, accused of excesses, have already been arrested.

RUSSIA'S LOSS.
London, Sept. 1.—The tour which Prince Lobanoff-Rostovsky had planned to take with the Czar through the countries of Western Europe was expected to be most far-reaching in results affecting the settlement of the eastern question. Francis Joseph paid Prince Lobanoff-Rostovsky the highest honors during the recent visit of the Czar to Vienna, and his death at the present juncture is regarded as a most dramatic and important event, upsetting, as it does, all possibilities of conferences between the foreign Ministers of the great powers and compelling the Czar to change the plans concerning his tour through Germany, France and England.

The London Post says that Prince Lobanoff-Rostovsky was at the moment of his death the first Minister in Europe who had baffled Japan in the far east, and successfully flouted Europe in Armenia. The Standard says that a heavy blow has fallen upon Russia in the death of the prince, whom the paper compares with Prince Bismarck.

Death was due to aneurism. Prince Lobanoff's body was taken to Kieff, where it was embalmed.
