

Apples Kept Sound Sixteen Months A. J. Forsythe, of Nineveh, Ind., has sent to the News an apple gathered in October, 1901. It is of the Gravenstein variety, of which he has two trees. They are hardy and good bearers. He gathers the apples in October and puts them in barrels until cold enough to put them away for the winter. Then he puts them in other barrels, with about four inches of dirt on top, and covers with planks so as to keep the dirt dry. About the 1st of April the apples are taken out of the barrels and placed in the cellar. In this way he can keep a harvest of apples until the harvest of the next year. Forsythe thinks his way of burying apples is the best way to keep all varieties of apples. He would like to know if there is another apple which has kept as long and is as sound as the sample here described.—Indianapolis News. the apples in October and puts them in
