ANTUNG WILL SEE FIRST BATTLE

Indications Are That the Initial Clash Is Close at Hand.

Tokio, April 4.—According to Japanese reports, the Russians have evacuated posts from Takushan, in Southern Manchuria, to the Yalu River. Between Antung and Kicheng they have constructed batteries on the heights, but only few guns have been mounted on them. In the same district parapets and pillboxes have been erected. As to the Russian force at Antung, there is no definite information, but it is estimated at 30,000. Antung is evidently the base of Russian operations in the Yalu district. The Chinese forces are expected to dispute the passage of the river vigorously. Meanwhile they are keeping in constant touch with the Japanese advance, and are offering all possible resistance to it. The chief base of the Russian army is Liao Yang, 150 miles from Antung. According to the latest reports, Liao Yang is now comparatively quiet. It is held by 8,000 men, the main force having moved towards the Yalu. Reinforcements, however, are expected. All indications point to a decisive battle soon in the neighborhood of Antung, barring a successful flank movement on the part of the Japanese forces. There are indications that such a movement is in progress. Feng Wang Tung, thirty miles northwest of Antung, is held by 5,000 Russian troops.

Cremation is growing in public favor in Scotland. From the latest report of the Scottish Burial Reform and Cremation Society we learn that for the year ending September 30th last, 25 cremations were carried out in Scotland, being an increase of 19 over the number of the preceding year. The total up to the present time is 122. For a reduced charge of six guineas, a certificate is now issued in Scotland carrying the rights, first, to one cremation, either in Glasgow or any other crematorium in Great Britain, and, second, to a niche for the deposit of the ashes in the Columbarium at Maryhill, Glasgow.

WANTS NO SECRECY

Rev. Dr. Mackay Would Have the Names of Cockfighters Published.

In the course of his sermon at Chalmers Church, Woodstock, on Sunday night, the pastor, Rev. Dr. Mackay, made pointed reference to the interrupted cocking main near Eastwood, at which a number of London "sports" were arrested. He said in part:

"I am a native of this county and have spent nearly half my life in this city. I would like to regard this as a model city. I would like to think that in intelligence, culture, benevolence, and in everything that goes to constitute true nobility of character, our citizens stand in the front rank. And yet, what must I say? I am burdened; I am oppressed. The blush of

shame mantled my cheek, when I read in our local press that so many of our citizens were willing to degrade themselves by attending a miserable cockfight, contrary to the law of our land, and contrary to every principle of culture and humanity. I have read of heated Chinese gambling over beetles, and finding enjoyment in watching rats drowning in a tub. We have often heard of Spain brutalized by her bull-baiting exhibitions. And now we have men in this enlightened town of Woodstock, ahead of negro Chinese or Spaniards, guzzling their beer and whisky and gambling in a cock-fight. And some of them would have us look up to them—yes, to the cockpit aristocracy of our town. Thanks to our chief of police and those associated with him for doing their duty so faithfully and effectively. And I am sure we will all uphold the hands of our police magistrate in meting out well-merited punishment to those who, by this brutal exhibition, have brought disgrace upon themselves and their city before the whole country. Let strict justice be done; no secrecy, but names published as in the case of the most vulgar criminals."
