Toronto, April 7.—The projected tour of Premier Ross and the members of his cabinet throughout Ontario as far as Sault Ste. Marie is now definitely settled to begin tomorrow. Hon. J. R. Stratton and Hon. F. R. Latchford will address a Liberal meeting at North Bay, the point at which the Temiskaming Railway will commence, tomorrow.

Premier Ross and the remaining ministers will leave Toronto tomorrow evening, reaching North Bay Wednesday morning, joining Messrs. Stratton and Latchford and proceeding westward at once.

Hon. Mr. Dryden and Hon. Mr. Latchford will stop over at Sturgeon Falls on Wednesday for an hour or two to address the West Nipissing Liberal convention, which will be held there that day.

On arrival at Sudbury at noon on Wednesday the first party, including the premier, will be given a reception, and, in a stop of an hour or so, a public meeting will be held.

In the afternoon the start will be made for the Sault, stops being made at several stations, and addresses may be given from the train.

Wednesday night will be spent in lying over at some small station, and Thursday will be occupied in traveling the remainder of the distance to the Sault, a number of further meetings being addressed from the car. This is a portion of New Ontario where rapid settlement and development is proceeding, and the contact between the ministers and the settlers will doubtless be of mutual advantage.

The distinguished tourists will reach Sault Ste. Marie on Thursday evening, and Friday will be present in pursuing the primary object of the trip, an inspection of the Clergue syndicate's immense steel plant, where the recently inaugurated process of manufacturing steel rails will be witnessed. In the evening a public meeting will be held in the interests of the Liberal candidate in Sault Ste. Marie, Mr. C. N. Smith.

The return journey will be commenced immediately after the meeting, and, it is hoped, connection will be made at North Bay with the train reaching Toronto in the afternoon of Saturday.

POLITICAL POINTS. The prohibitionists of East and West Wellington will hold a convention at Drayton on the 10th inst., to decide on the course of action in the coming elections.

A Liberal convention for North Perth will be held at Milverton on the 10th inst. to select a candidate for the legislature.

West Peterboro Conservatives nominated Major J. W. Miller of Peterboro, for the Legislative Assembly.

It is expected that Mr. Sam Clarke, ex-M.P.P., will be the choice of the West Northumberland Liberal convention.

The prohibitionists of South Wellington, after considerable discussion nominated Ald. Samuel Carter as the prohibition candidate. Mr. Carter accepted the nomination on condition that a sum sufficient to carry on a vigorous campaign was raised. A committee was appointed to secure the funds.

GETS SEVEN YEARS

Isaac Kersey at Lambton Assizes, Sentenced to Seven Years in Prison.

Sarnia, Ont., April 7.—At the Lambton county assizes, the jury in the case of the Kersey brothers, of Oil Springs, charged with robbing the mails in February, 1898, returned a verdict of guilty against Isaac Kersey, and announced that the other two brothers, Walter and Joseph, were not guilty. The latter was then discharged.

Isaac Kersey was sentenced to seven years in Kingston penitentiary. The Kersey brothers conducted a general store at Oil Springs, in which the post-office was situated. One night in February, 1898, the safe, containing registered matter, was blown open and some \$400 stolen. The authorities, after a lengthy investigation, arrested the Kersey brothers.

WHAT WABASH WANTS.

Baltimore, April 7.—It is officially announced here that the Wabash system is the real party interested in the bid put in by the "Fuller syndicate" for the interests of this city in the Western Maryland railroad, and that Joseph Ramsey, Jr., president of the Wabash, has become a member of the syndicate. The purpose of the syndicate is to secure the Western Maryland and for the purpose of giving to the Wabash a line to tide water, and it has offered \$3,500,000 for the city's interest.

THE TROLLEY-POLE SLIPPED.

New York, April 7.—A number of persons were injured in a collision that occurred at Carlstadt, N. J., late last night, between a train on the New York and New Jersey Railroad and a trolley car of the Jersey City, Hoboken, and Patterson Trolley Company. Waldo Campbell, of Rutherford, N. J., it is said, cannot recover. The trolley pole slipped and the car was stalled on a crossing.
