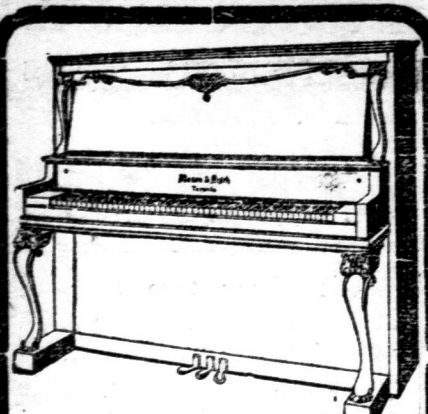

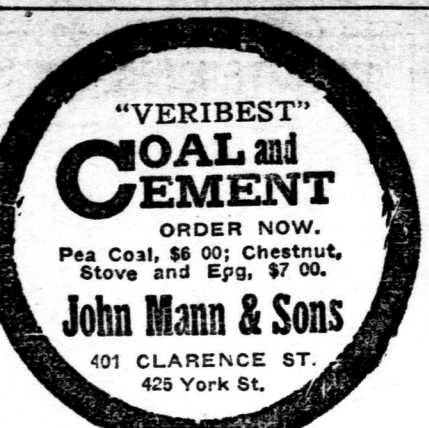

YOUNG DELINQUENTS
Resolution Adopted at Great Prison
Congress in Washington.

At the recent meeting in Washington
of the International Prison Congress,
there was careful consultation given to
the subject of youthful lawbreakers,
who are less than 10 years of age,
"delinquents," not "criminals." Mr. J.
Kelso, who was the representative of
Canada, states that the following
principles were unanimously agreed
upon by the congress:
Section IV., Question I.
Resolutions
1. Young delinquents should not be
subjected to the penal procedure now
applied to adults.
2. The principles that should guide
the procedure applied to young delin-

quents are as follows:
1. Those who are entrusted with the
cognizance of the cases of young de-
linquents should be primarily chosen
for their ability to understand and
sympathize with children, and should
have some special knowledge of the
social and psychological sciences.
2. They should have the assistance
of probation officers to make prelimi-
nary examination in each case, and to
watch over those put on probation.
3. There should be made in connec-
tion with the cases of young delin-
quents, such examinations as will con-
tribute to the fund of information on
juvenile delinquency, and the results
should be used whenever practicable to
help in the disposition of the case.
These examinations should be made
only by physicians who have some spe-
cial knowledge of the social and
psychological sciences. The personal
information obtained in these examina-
tions shall not be made public.
4. Whenever possible in the case of
young delinquents, arrest should be
avoided in bringing them before the
authorities, and orders for arrest
should be issued only in exceptional
cases.
5. When necessary to detain young
delinquents, the detention should not be
in quarters used for adults.
6. In those countries where a court is
entrusted with the cognizance of the
cases of young delinquents,
(a) Those cases should be heard at
the same session with cases of adults,
and
(b) It should be the tendency to
eliminate as soon as possible the
prosecution and defence, and to make
of the trial an examination by the
judge, first to enable him to make an
adjudication of the case; second, to
enable him to determine the character
and environment of the one whose case
he is hearing.

**ALD. TANCOCK BLAMED
THE ASSISTANT ENGINEER**
Declared in the Council That a
Certain Piece of Work Had
Been Poorly Done.

There was a little breeze in the
council last night over the filling in
of Mount Pleasant avenue, near the
cemetery, and Ald. Tancock made an
attack on Deputy Engineer Wright,
who, he declared, was guilty of a bad
piece of work.
Ald. Jeffries wanted to know who
was responsible for the job. He de-
clared that it was not a good piece of
work, and he would like to know why
it was done in such a manner, and
who was responsible. He advised all
the aldermen to go over the work and
see for themselves. Ald. Jeffries de-
clared he had done so, and he was not
satisfied with the manner in which the
city's money was spent.

Ald. Tancock then gave a long his-
tory of the work, and declared that
an irregular tender, \$225, had been re-
ceived by the committee and awarded.
The work could have been done for
\$250, and done right. The work was a
piece of engineering. Assistant En-
gineer Wright was responsible, and
should have seen it done properly. It
was schoolboy engineering.

Mayor Interferes.
"That is out of order," interrupted
Mayor Beattie. "You were asked a
simple question, and you have no right
to attack any person. Simply answer
the question."
"Well, then, the responsibility is
with the assistant engineer," said Ald.
Tancock.
"Why did you pass the account?"
asked Ald. Underwood.
"The contractor did all he could,"
answered Ald. Underwood.
"Why were not the specifications
lived up to?" asked Ald. Richter.
"Surely it was the duty of the chair-
man to see to that."
"It is not the duty of the chairman
to see that the specifications were
lived up to," declared Ald. Tancock.
"This does not seem fair to me,"
said Ald. Saunders. "Mr. Wright is
attacked without any chance to ex-
plain, or anything else. Give him a
chance."
"You are right," declared Mayor
Beattie. "We want fair play, and
we are going to have it."
Some time engineers draw speci-
fications, and chairmen change them,"
continued Ald. Saunders.
"Not this year," shot back Ald. Tan-
cock.
The matter then dropped.

**ALD. UNDERWOOD'S PHONE
MOTION SENT TO COMTEE**
"Public Ownership of a Natural
Monopoly Needed," Explained
the Alderman.

A motion to memorialize the On-
tario Government to purchase the Bell
Telephone Company was introduced
by Ald. Underwood and Ald. Eckert in
the city council last night.
That body was not ready to discuss
the motion, and it was referred to No. 1
committee, which will bring in a
recommendation on the subject.
This is simply public ownership of
a natural monopoly," said Ald. Under-
wood. "There is a duplication of sys-
tems throughout the Province, and a
great deal of inconvenience and an-
noyance is caused. We should have
one system covering this Province,
and it should be under Government
control and ownership. The cost of
telephones is excessive, there is no
doubt about that. In the United States
they get them for half what we pay
for them. This is the opportune time
to take over the system. Other mu-
nicipalities are moving along this line
and we should do our duty."
On the suggestion of Mayor Beattie
the motion was sent to No. 1 com-
mittee to deal with.

**LAYMEN WILL MEET
IN Y. M. C. A. NOV. 18**
Plans For the Winter's Work
Will Then Be Formu-
lated.

The annual meeting of the local
branch of the International Laymen's
Missionary Movement will be held on
the evening of Friday, Nov. 18.
The delegates will meet in the
Y. M. C. A., where they will dine to-
gether at 6.30, and afterwards for-
mulate their plans for the winter work
of the organization.
