to preach at Salem after an absence of twenty-one years. He referred touchingly to the old worthies of the past who had gone to their reward, and complicated the people in their beautiful place of worship, with its appropriate memorial windows. His sermons Sabbath morning on the character and conduct of Daniel to the young people, and at night to the more general congregation from the words, "Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free," were quickening masterpieces, appealing alike to heart and intellect. On Monday evening his subject was "God in World Politics," a theme treated in keeping with its greatness, fortified by history, illustrated graphically by passing events, and enlivened by incisive humor that made the people forget that lectures were ever considered "dry." The Mendelssohn Quartette, of London, entertained the audience generously with a varied programme of instrumental music, and Miss L. Kunz, contralto soloist, of London, delighted all with several numbers that disclosed the growing strength, sweetness and expression of a well-trained voice.

The generous food supper served by the ladies in the Sabbath school rooms was thoroughly appreciated, and led everybody to conclude that newspaper tales about the shortage of farm produce and the high cost of living must be exaggerated. At the Sabbath services the choir and orchestra of the church, under the leadership of Mrs. J. D. Thompson, with Mrs. Arthur Weldon as soloist, led the service of praise, with fine effect, and gave several choruses in a manner that added to the pleasure and inspiration of the occasion. As usual the offering were liberal, and the anniversary in every way one long to be remembered.

GRADUATE UNDER B. E. ASSOCIATION.

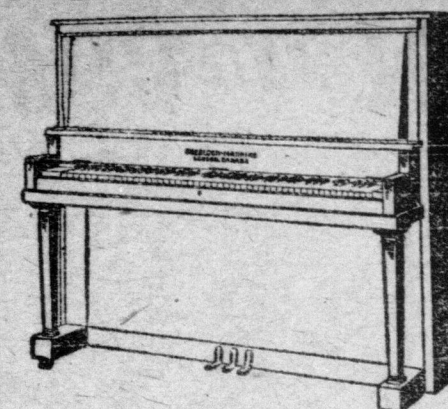

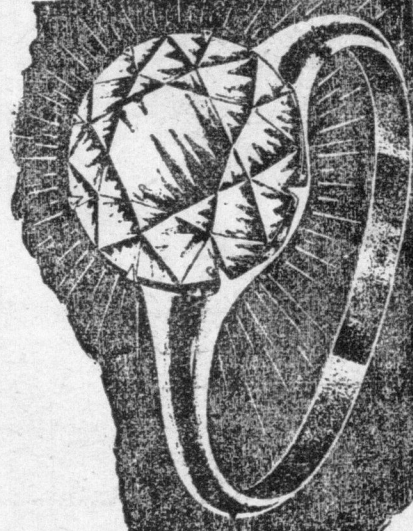
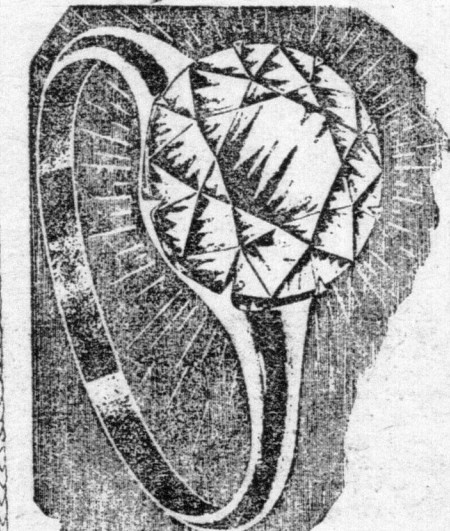
