VARIOUS VIEWPOINTS OF SUFFRAGE LECTURE GIVEN BY LADY HOLDER

Famous Speaker Brands as Absurd the Associating of Masculinity With Cause—Reforms Only Possible Through Votes for Women.

That the masculine viewpoint, or the average masculine viewpoint of the "votes for women" propaganda is vastly different from the feminine, or average feminine viewpoint of the same thing, has been once again proven. Last night Lady Holder, the famous Australian campaigner for the enfranchisement of all women, addressed a suffrage meeting in the Masonic Hall. Two "advertiser" reporters "covered" the meeting. One was a woman reporter, the other a mere man.

In HER story of the meeting the girl reporter declares: "Perhaps no better argument in favor of woman suffrage has ever been advanced in the city of London than the presence in the new Masonic Temple last evening of Lady Holder, of South Australia. Lady Holder's quiet and dignified personality, together with her simple, yet forceful logic, formed a strong argument in favor of the enfranchisement of women, and would go far towards destroying the threadbare statements that suffrage takes women from the home and makes her masculine."

In HIS story the mere male says: "London's interest in the equal suffrage movement must be at a very low ebb. In spite of the widest advertising, Lady Holder failed to attract more than a handful of people."

The different viewpoints are here, and apparently the only thing left for the mere outsider to do is to read both accounts of the meeting and take his or her choice.

THE FEMININE VIEWPOINT

Perhaps no better argument in favor of woman suffrage has ever been advanced in the City of London than the presence in the new Masonic Temple last evening of Lady Holder, of South Australia. Lady Holder's quiet and dignified personality, together with her simple, yet forceful logic, formed a strong argument in favor of the enfranchisement of women, and would go far towards destroying the threadbare statements that suffrage takes women from the home and makes her masculine.

Work of Pioneer.

Step by step, Lady Holder traced the history of the enfranchisement of women in Australia. She told of the efforts made by a few pioneer spirits to obtain equal suffrage privileges, and of the final success when the Women's Christian Temperance Union of Australia united with the suffragists in their work. Seventeen years ago the full franchise was granted, and from that time women have voted equally with men, all individuals over the age of 21 years having the ballot.

"We had just the same objections advanced against women voting as you have today. It would take women from the home, they would be electing and talking politics, while the men had to mind the babies and cook the dinners. We should become masculine. How absurd! All this was has been proved by the type of the average Australian woman. She loves her home just as much as ever, and attends to it, and is very thoroughly feminine," said the speaker.

Canadian Women Should Vote.

Lady Holder further expressed herself as being hopeful that the women of Canada would obtain the vote. She firmly believed that it was coming. Then there would be a greater chance to obtain some of the reforms for which women were working. "By having the ballot, woman is placed on an equal platform with men. She has a power behind her without which she might work night and day without accomplishing any reform for the betterment of her own sex or for her children."

"It has been found to be the case in Australia. Although no millennium has been brought about, there were many improved conditions as a result of the enfranchisement of the women of the country. Parliament was much cleaner. There were very few men at whom the finger of criticism could be pointed. This was not the case in years gone by."

Courteous Treatment.

In regard to the polling booth not being a place for a lady, Lady Holder said it was really much the same as attending the same church which men attended. To go to the booth and cast the vote required but about 20 minutes' time; women were courteously treated away.

In answer to the argument that women would not vote even if they possessed the privilege, Lady Holder stated that in Australia at the last general election, some two years ago, 72 per cent. voted, the women numbering equal with the men. In some states 82 per cent. of the women voted.

Are Not Seeking Fame.

"It is not that women want to become mayors or judges or other officers, or act on juries—I think this is very necessary, too, where the interests of women and children are concerned—but simply that as in the home she shares the family troubles and sorrows with her husband and brothers, she may do the same in public life. To do this it needs take her out of the home very little," said Lady Holder in conclusion.

Mrs. Gordon Wright, president of the London Suffrage Society, who introduced the speaker, voiced her regret that there was not a larger attendance to hear such a distinguished visitor to London. On the platform were a number of executive committee members of the London Suffrage Society, including Mrs. E. M. Tilley, Mrs. Talbot Macbeth, Mrs. John Carling, Mrs. Ashplant, president of the W. C. T. U.; Miss Fowler and Miss Farncomb. Rev. H. H. Bingham and Mr. Gordon Wright were also present and spoke briefly.
