## WANTS COUNCIL TO GIVE MAYOR POWER TO ISSUE INJUNCTION

Row Is Brewing Over Question of City Auditing.

CLAIMS ACT VIOLATED

Ald. Ashplant Gives Notice of Motion at Last Night's Meeting.

The question of city audits is a customary one at city council, and last evening the rule was followed. Ald. Ashplant wanted to know whether or not Frank G. Jewell had presented a certificate of audit for the half-year ending June 30, when he ceased to be city auditor. When informed that he had not, Ald. Ashplant asked that he be notified again to complete the audit, so that the work of City Auditor Dunlop be not hampered.

Later he had Mayor Stevenson and himself named a committee to discuss the matter with the utilities commission, and explain why one auditor with that municipal act, or by section 9 and 10 of the waterworks act, especially if not recommended by the responsible city auditor.

Whereas, the commission referred to has declared its intention, through its chairman, to pay the said sum of \$2,100 to assistants who, previous to the appointment of the present city auditor, Mr. Dunlop, C.A., were paid only \$450 by the said commission, as shown by its own records, and

Direct Insult.

Whereas, such procedure is not only a violation of the municipal act governing the audit department, and is a direct insult to the head of the department, but is opposed to the declared policy of this council, in regard to the consolidation of the audits of the city departments, as set forth in its records, and further is not in the public interest.

Therefore, this council authorizes its worship the mayor to, if occasion arises, issue an injunction restraining any board or commission which is financed by debentures for which this council is responsible, from making any appropriation for audit assistance not in accord with, or not authorized by the municipal act, or by sections 9 and 10 of the waterworks act, especially if not recommended by the responsible city auditor.

That happiness is to be obtained only by obeying natural impulses is amply demonstrated by Clara Kimball Young's presentation of "The Common Law," by Robert W. Chambers, at the Lyric Theatre all this week. The experiences which precede this discovery by Valerie West, artist-model and philosopher, seems literally to live the part. The supporting cast is an able one. Every member of it is a star.

The opening scene, laid in New York, depicts the death of Valerie's mother. Valerie is forced to seek employment. The stage, where she first attempts to earn money, proves to be unsuitable for a person of her refinement. Driven to despair, she offers to act as a model for Kelly Neville, a brilliant artist and meat painter. She proves to be the inspiration which he requires to complete his masterpiece.

Complications follow. He is attracted by her, although at the time deeply in love with his father's ward, Stephanie. Complications ensue, with a portrait painter, Jose Quenda, and form an interesting climax to a plot which is intensely interesting throughout.

The leading role gives plenty of opportunity for the portrayal of sympathy, self and noble womanhood, and Clara Kimball Young makes full use of it. Conway Tearle, as Kelly Neville, exhibits dramatic ability of the highest type. The character of Stephanie, pretty and ardent lover of Neville, is taken by Lillian Cook. Edna Stuntz, artist-model and friend of Valerie, is another star.

The scenes, laid for the most part in New York, are works of art in themselves. Albert Casella, director-general of the play, has provided a fine background for a masterpiece of twentieth century drama.

Splendid Program.

"The Common Law" provides an evening's entertainment by itself, but other features are included in the program, making it complete in every detail. A film of the "Sea America First" series is an interesting feature, and animated cartoons depicting the adventures of a pig and his trip to the market provide an amusing few minutes. This is climaxed by an interesting vocal solo by Betty Do Witt, pleasing every audience on Monday, and promise to be a feature of the week. Her voice is a soprano of rare quality. Music throughout the evening is provided by the Lyric orchestra, and is an entertainment by itself. The pictures will be shown all this week and should prove a popular treat with Londoners as they have with theatre patrons of all the larger cities in which they have been shown. The play teaches a great moral lesson.

## SHOULD NOT GRUMBLE IF EGGS SOAR TO \$1 A DOZEN VERY SOON

May Have None at All Next Winter, Says Expert.

FEED STEADILY CLIMBING

Woman Poultry-Raiser Gives Practical Talk at Big Gathering.

Miss Nicholson, poultry expert, of Chelsea, Quebec, demonstrated yesterday afternoon in her lecture in Cronyn Hall that the most practical subject that can be made interesting to people who have imagined they could not possibly be interested in it, is the raising of poultry.

The large audience, including men as well as women, who gathered at 3:30 o'clock to hear Miss Nicholson speak on the subject of "Poultry Raising," was amply instructed that many in London are engaged in poultry raising and want to know more about it.

They are interested in the subject from the standpoint of the big money to be made.

The speaker especially urged the patriotic duty at this time of helping to increase the food supply, advising her hearers wherever at all feasible to go in for poultry raising in order to supply their own tables and make possible larger shipments of poultry and eggs to the old country.

Cost of Eggs.

Concerning the high cost of eggs, she made a statement which caused her audience to sit up and wonder if they could believe their own ears. It was this: "If you paid a dollar a dozen for eggs, you should not grumble. Sixty cents, perhaps you will have none at all next winter. It is a serious question. Great Britain before the war was largely supplied with eggs by Russia and Belgium. The Russian farmers kept from fifteen to twenty hens, the Belgian farmers never knew how many hens they had feeding among the grape vines. They specialized in white and brown Leghorns. Feed is Costly.

The speaker gave as one reason for her statement that eggs at 50 cents a dozen are cheap the doubling in the price of wheat and the increase in other feed.

The subject was touched upon of selling eggs and the view advanced by Miss Nicholson that she did not consider the selling of eggs by the dozen entirely fair. "Selling by weight, instead," she stated, "would be a very desirable step forward."

No more wish than to hear Miss Nicholson be able to comfort those who are disappointed when uncertain of the sanitary condition of other food, they can always satisfy the hunger by ordering eggs cooked in the shell.

"I strongly advocate keeping eggs clean," she said. "Because the shell of the egg is so porous, and the bacteria does not clean it. Washing only runs the dirt into the egg." The better way she proposed was rubbing off the egg without shaking, breaking and peeling, and not wishing to use at once, covering the broken egg with water until ready to cook.

Buying Poultry.

Concerning the buying of poultry, she insisted that poultry properly dressed for sale should not have a single feather or left upon it.

"But," she said, "unless it is from somebody you know and are absolutely sure you can rely upon, never buy poultry that is drawn and has the head removed. Your only safeguard is to see the head and entrails."

"By the head you can tell whether or not the bird has the head removed. A form of apoplexy, with rump the head swells around the eyes, the mouth opens and the bird dies. The head is swollen and the eyes cannot be hidden."

Special reference was made to two other diseases of poultry, i.e., trouble and tuberculosis. Tuberculosis reveals itself by white spots on the liver. "I have seen virus as this appeared for," said Miss Nicholson. "That if you held a lighted match at one side you could see it through the other."

Tubercular Pests.

"Again, I have seen apparently fat hens, weighing ten pounds, that were tubercular. The following directions were given for distinguishing between healthy and tubercular meat: "Healthy meat is yellow and gives to pressure of the fingers. The fat of the tubercular fowl is white and hard. The tubercular fat clings to the flesh. Tear it away and you find it has made up a large percentage of the weight. Sever by a bird when the tubercles are sharp and unpaired. Such a bird almost always has had tuberculosis."

In regard to the argument that a tubercular fowl is cooked it does no harm, Miss Nicholson stated that a trained nurse by profession before going into poultry raising, had this to say: "I find tubercular fowl is healthy food. It is impossible for something that has died in sickness to be healthy food. The idea of giving fowl that has been diseased to a patient recovering from illness that has meant hovering near the gates of death at best repulsive food." "I cannot believe it is sanitary food," she said.

Nothing Impossible.

Concerning the raising of poultry she met the objection that a city lot is no place for poultry, as follows: "The
