

Dear Sir,—Pursuant to the police magistrates extended jurisdiction act, which went into force on July 1921, the Government is so extending the territorial jurisdiction of the police magistrates that each municipality will be covered by a police magistrate's commission, and for future justices of the peace will try no cases except bylaw cases.
